Indian Goes to Higher Court in Connection With Fortier Robbery

Fred Auriol appeared in the city police court this morning before Magistrate McClymont on a charge of breaking and entering the residence of Mrs. A. Fortier, 701 Eighth Ave. West, on pearl necklace, diamond and ruby ring, scarf pins and liquor. The charges against Thos. Cook and George Cunningham of being in possession of stolen property in nection with the robbery were withdrawn. Evidence was taken against accused who was committed for trial.

In giving evidence, Mrs. Fortier state dthat, upon arriving at her residence at 8 o'clock on Christmas Eve, the upstair door she found locked with the key turned on the inside. Upon discovering this, assistance was oblained from W. A. Bell who effected an entrance. The interior of the place had been ransacked nd the contents of drawers disrranged and the loss of the ewellery was discovered. Mrs. Fortier then identified a pearl recklace, loose pearls, diamond and ruby ring from which the uby was missing, two nugget ins, a gold safety pin, and sevral loose pearls.

Police Sergeant Bailey, who was in charge of investigations in connection with the robbery. stated that on the morning of December 26 he had arrested Geo. Cunningham on suspicion n connection with the robbery. fe had encountered Conningham n the police station about to be cleased on a charge of assault. le had taken him into the office nd questioned him before police hief Vickers and elicted the information which led to the artest of Thos. Cook at the Emoress Hotel. Later Sergeant Bailey had gone to the Regent's Hotel and interviewed the acused, Fred Auriol, whom he took o the police station and ques-Upon searching the risoner, he found several pearls n his possession and arrested !!

Sergeant Bailey stated he had cone to Bulger & Cameron's and found a stick nugget pin and a brooch nugget pin, and Mr. lulger had identified the prisoner as the man who took the goods to the store. A loose pearl had also been found in a vest belonging to the prisoner hanging ! u his room at the hotel. In the morning of December 27 Sereant Bailey had recovered two ings from J. Salsdon, proprietor f the Western Rooms, who told him he had obtained the rings from a Mrs. Auckland.
