HUNTRESS OF SPROAT LAKE

Lady Lives in Houseboat and Traps and Hunts for Her Daily Bread

Nimrod got his name in the Bible as a mighty hunter, but Mrs. Wark of Sproat Lake, Vancouver Island, was born after the book had gone to press. However, Mrs. Wark's friends don't concede Nimrod a thing. They only know about Nimrod through hearsay, but they have seen the trophies that Mrs. Wark brings home.

She is a unique character, primitive in her calling but up-to-date herself. Her home is her houseboat on Sproat Lake, not far from Alberni, and there she lives alone except for an old man who does such jobs as mending traps, helping with the boats, cleaning the guns, cooking the meals and dressing the pelts.

The houseboat is reached by a trail that winds away through the forest, and when a visitor finally reaches his destination he is likely to find Mrs. Wark in mooseskins and velveteens, with a cartridge belt about her, and, like as not, an axe and a heavy automatic thrust in it. A tweed hat will doubtless be shading her steady quiet eyes. There is usually a dog at her heels. Three miles away from the houseboat is Mrs. Wark's guest house, not even accessible by trail, and there she has a wonderful collection of pelts and trophies.

Mrs. Wark is the Empress of this Wonderland, which spreads for many miles about Sproat Lake; for it is more truly "hers" than if she owned it. She knows every flower and plant, every bird and insect. She knows all the haunts and habits of the animals, all the moods of the weather. She loves to talk of them. A poet in taste, she surveys her empire with all the romantic sentiment of Hiawatha and muses on it with the joy of Keats.

Cougar Before Breakfast
But her prowess! This lady of the lake, with the cultured mind, the heart of oak, shoots cougar before breakfast, pots bear in the afternoon, hunts deer before tea, and at sundown sets traps for beaver and rodents—all in their season, of course. During the winter, she lives alone with her dogs and an aged retainer who mends the traps, helps with the boats, cleans the guns, cooks the meals and helps in dressing the pelts.

Not even the retainer accompanies her, however, on her hunting and trapping excursions which are the feature of her romantic year. Alone she makes her way up one or other of those long fingers of the lake, hugging the jade-green shore; alone she penetrates the forest in quest of game. is never empty handed; more often it is with some hundreds of dollars' worth of peltries—fox, badger, raccoon, mink and beaver—with certainly a deer or two, a bear, a grey wolf, and a couple of cougars. Her food and camping outfit, together with her gun, she had left in the boat, with the dog on guard. Returning an hour later, she was dumfounded to find the dog, the canoe and its contents gone.

Long Way from Home
Darkness was already falling, and the nearest habitation was many miles away, separated from her by deep forest, on the one hand, and the icy waters of the lake on the other. Her absence at headquarters would provoke no alarm, as her excursions were always of uncertain duration. And there was the disquieting mystery of the boat's disappearance, and the dog's.

That night she lay down, anxious and hungry, on a couch of fir. In the early dawn she drew in her belt and set out along the shore in the direction of home hoping in two days' time to reach a point opposite headquarters and attract attention. At nightfall on the following day, however, on approaching a spur of land that jutted out into the lake, she heard, at long and regular intervals, the mournful howl of a dog; and, on turning the promontory, beheld the canoe with her animal aboard drifting slowly—by what heaven directed current she knows not—towards the nearer shore.
