MICHIGAN CITY, June ". -Tommy Gibbons got the decision, decisively defeating Georges Carpentier in a ten round bout here! Saturday afternoon. Gibbons virtually won every round. In the ninth Carpentier sank to the floor and indicated an injured ankle, but struggled to his feet; and came back and finished the fight. There was no knockdown.

Gibbons had Carpentier groggy and staggering half a dozen times and only Carpentier's refusal to battle saved him from a knockout. Georges ,bleeding from the mouth and with a cut over th eye, limped from the ring between his seconds, a thoroughly defeated boxer.

Carpentier withstood a shower of books and right smashes meant to end the contest, but continually retreated and then clinched or forced Gibbons to chase him. Gibbons fought a perfect, beautifully planned fight. He beat his foe to every punch. The vim, vigor and vitality radiated by the Frenchman as he entered the ring was in sickening contrast to the battered, wobbly, limping mar who departed at the end.
