ARGENTINE FIGHTER LUIS FIRPO IS SUED FOR LIBEL IN NEW YORK COURTS

Argentine Fighter Is Sued for Libel at New York by Civic League

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 .- United States Commissioner Hitchcock has postponed until September 20 the hearing of the perjury charges against Luis Firpo made by Canon William Chase on behalf of the New York Civic League. Firpo's fight with Wills is scheduled to take place on September 11.

Issuance of the warrant was the result of a campaign for Firpo's deportation waged by the league ever since Firpo arrived from Argentine in company with Miss Picart several week ago. KINDERSLEY Firpo had told the immigration authorities he and Miss Picart


