## NOT FLYING RACE BUT EFFORT TO BE ROUND WORLD FIRST

Chance of Success Favor Americans Declares Editorial Writer

The chief of the American army air service, it was announced, declined the suggestion made by the head of the royal air force that the round-the-world flights being undertaken by the airmen of the two countries should be put on a sporting basis and regarded as a race. Despite this, they will be viewed in that light by most of those who follow the news of the progress of the two parties. In fairness to both, however, it should be kept in mind that there is a very great difference in the conditions under which the attempts are being made.

The British are using but one machine carrying four men and the chances are heavily against it being able to make the round of the globe. The Americans have four machines and are going on the slow but sure plan. They left Los Angeles on March 17 and their schedule does not call for them to be at Washington till August 8. They will not fly when the weather is stormy. Going by way of Iceland and Greenland, they will avoid very long over-sea flights, while the British hope to repeat the achievement of Alcock and Brown, who dashed straight across the Atlantic in sixteen hours in 1919. The Americans are seeking to establish an aerial trade route and declare that by getting back safely to the United States they will have obtained glory enough in demonstrating the practicability of this, even though they do take the greater part of the year's good flying weather to accomplish the feat. At various stations along the route replacement parts and extra Liberty engines will be available.—Edmonton Bulletin.

## BRITISH HANGMAN RESIGNS POSITION

John Ellis Got Fifty Shillings for Each Execution and Similar Amount for Conduct

LONDON, April 1.—John Ellis, the official hangman of Great Britain, has resigned his job but has not given any reason for doing so. For over twenty-three years he had held the position and dozens of criminals, notorious and otherwise, passed through his hands to their doom.

Ellis lives at Rochdale, where for several years he had a barber shop. He is very devoted to animals. He is a student of criminology and reads the accounts of murder trials in the newspapers with professional interest.

His fee for dispatching a criminal was fifty shillings and another fifty shillings for "good conduct." The latter amount was paid in consideration of the fact that he was forbidden to stay at a public house near the scene of the execution and earn a commission for attracting custom as was the executioner's privilege in former years.

Ellis is a breeder of poultry and it is said that he is so devoted to his birds that he gets a friend to wring the necks of those he wants to kill.

## NURSES NOT GIVEN AN EIGHT HOUR DAY

HAMILTON, March 31.—The question of an eight-hour day for nurses was introduced at the meeting of the hospital board here when a letter from the Trades and Labor council, which requested that the nursing staff be placed on an eight hour day basis, instead of two shifts of twelve hours each, was dealt with. The matter was referred to the general superintendent and superintendent of nurses for a report.

"It would be impracticable for private nursing," said Dr. W. Langrill, general superintendent. "It would require three nurses to complete the full day, would to a certain extent disorganize treatment and would not be in the interests of the patients, he pointed out.

## VENGEANCE OF PAGAN GODS ON DESECRATORS

Only Evil Will Come to Those Who Fail to Respect Heathen Heiau

HONOLULU, April 1.—The gods of ancient Hawaii again wreaked their vengeance upon the whites who made merry upon the site of a former heiau, or old-time temple of worship, according to Hawaiian superstition, when the famous clubhouse of the Order of Elks on the beach at Waikiki was damaged by fire to the extent of \$65,000.

The flames, caused by defective wiring, were the last of a series of untoward events, including murder, that occurred at the site of the heiau, which nestles at the foot of Diamond Head. According to Hawaiian medicine men, only evil will come to those who desecrate the site of an ancient heiau.

The clubhouse was built many years ago by the late James B. Castle, a descendant of the missionaries who came from New England to the islands in 1820, as a residence for his family. During the occupancy of the Castle family two Japanese were murdered in the grounds and attention was called at that time to the tradition of the heiau.

Mayor Newton notified the aldermen at last night's council meeting that an invitation had been extended to all the members of the city council by Jarvis H. McLeod, local representative of the U.S. round-the-world flight, to be present at Seal Cove when the American fliers arrive from Seattle this week.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

**PRE-EMPTIONS**  
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens, on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.  
Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre, west of the Coast Range and 2,000 feet per acre east of that range.  
Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.  
Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

**PURCHASE**  
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

**HOMESITE LEASES**  
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

**LEASES**  
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.  
**GRAZING**  
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
