# EASY WIN FOR SONS OF CANADA

Defeated Englishmen in Football Game by Score of 7 to 1

Before a large crowd of soccer fans on the Acropolis Hill grounds last evening the Sons of England football team went down to defeat at the hands of the Sons of Canada by a score of 7 to 1. Harvey scored the only point for the Sons of England in the first half of the game, while the scorers for the Sons of Canada were: J. Marks 2, E. Erskine 4, and Les Lane 1.

The teams lined up as follows: Sons of Canada—S. Gawthorn, goal; V. Menzies and H. Menzies, backs; J. Mitchell, J. Marks and G. Mitchell, half backs; L. Lane, E. Smith, J. McDougall, S. Erskine and A. Mitchell, forwards. Sons of England—D. Howe, goal; A. Lane and D. Lambie, backs; P. Cameron, G. Kelsey and T. Tinker, half backs; G. Hill, Dickens, A. Woolton, H. S. Burn and Harvey, forwards. Geo. Russell was referee, and Geo. Waugh and A. Clapperton were linesmen.

The Sons of Canada were very aggressive throughout the game and forced the Englishmen to keep on the defensive. The Canucks to start lost the toss and kicked against the sun and uphill. Harvey, for the Sons of England, made the first tally in a mixup between the S.O.C. goalkeeper and H. Menzies. J. Marks, S.O.C., fouled in the penalty area, giving the English boys a chance. However, the penalty kick, taken by H. S. Burn, was stopped by Gawthorn in goal for the Canadians. S. Erskine was the next to score for the Canucks when Howe let the ball slip from his hands. From the centre the Canucks again got busy and S. Erskine soon found the net again with a nicely placed shot. The score at half time stood 2-4 in favor of the Sons of Canada.
