Recommends that Local Hospital should Have Diet Kitchen for Use of Student Nurses

The fallowing report on the Prince Rupert General Hospital training school for nurses was submitted to the hospital board at last night's regular monthly meeting by Miss Helen Randal, R.N. of Vancouver, registrar of the Graduate Nurses' Association of British Columbia:

As you know I have recently visited your hospital and inspected the school for nurses, and looked into both the practical and theoretical teaching of the students. I find the hospital well eared for, clean and with painting of the interior in progress. Patients were apparently well looked after, the food good, and well served, and a very general feeling of satisfaction with the nursing force seemed evident among the patients.

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
