

JAPAN WILL NEED MUCH LUMBER SOON

VICTORIA, July 3.—Renewed movement of timber from this Coast to Japan should commence shortly, according to Chobei Yamamoto, a prominent timber merchant of Tokio, who arrived from the Orient aboard the Africa Maru en route to Seattle and Vancouver on a buying trip.

Permanent building permits were issued in Tokio and suburbs the week of his departure from Japan, and the districts in which permanent buildings will be erected total twenty-four all told. The issuance of these permits were met the first day with many applications and it is expected that the lumber market will strengthen again on this continent as a result. Construction material will be needed in the very near future as soon as the supply on hand is diminished.

All buildings are governed by the rules set forth in the revised regulations drawn up by the civic authorities. They are very strict as regards fireproof and earthquake resistance.

FOREST AND FIELD CLUB COMING HERE

Are at Ottawa Today and Will Then Come West and Visit Stewart

MONTREAL, July 3.—Ottawa is being invaded today by eighty members of the Forest and Field Club of Boston who are making the capital their first stopping point on a trip which will take them over the Canadian National Railways across Canada to Prince Rupert and Vancouver. In addition to Ottawa, Jasper Park and Prince Rupert, they will also make the scenic sea voyage from Prince Rupert as far north as Stewart and down the British Columbia coast to Vancouver. They will spend two days at Jasper Park and while there will engage in a number of hiking trips along the mountain trails.

The party will return home through the United States. G. K. Howard, general tourist agent of the Canadian National Railways, will accompany the party as far as Winnipeg and from there they will be accompanied by an officer of the western region.

This is the first of a number of transcontinental parties of a similar nature that will be taken across Canada by the Canadian National Railways this year.
