# RADIO STATIC

By The Daily News Radio Expert.

### New Low Loss Instruments

During the last few months the radio fraternity all over the continent have begun to realize that their so called perfect receivers were by no means so, and are earnestly endeavoring to improve upon their sets in every respect. Especially in one direction have their efforts been placed; namely in eliminating all kinds of current losses that have manifested themselves upon diligent investigation. Thereupon was started the low loss war. Today there is hardly a single manufacturer but has not bettered his apparatus in some way or other by reducing losses to a minimum. Pyrex, quartz, and air are rapidly coming into prominence as the only insulators with extremely low losses. Thus it is that the latest instruments utilize these for this purpose. The effects are evident—sockets have taken on a new appearance, variable condensers have been completely redesigned, induction coils have been remodelled, and without the appearance and performance of a new low loss type receiver meets with instant approval. Indeed a new low loss four tube receiver has often equalled the old style five tube one with respect to results obtained. This low loss war marks another distinct advancement in the progress of radio and is one of the many needed steps in the right direction—namely, that of simplifying and standardizing radio.

### Eliminate Noises

If you can hear noises, such as hisses and crackles in your set which do not all seem to be static disconnect the aerial and ground, then if the noises still continue you may be sure that this source is internal. Examine the batteries, especially the plate one and test them for voltage. Very often the trouble can be remedied by changing around the detector B battery and using another one in its place.

Another very good idea for the experimenter is to have a strip of bakelite on which are binding posts for the aerial, ground, A. B. and C batteries respectively, mounted permanently on your radio table. Then when another new circuit is to be tried all the external connections are at hand and you don't have to go raking it over the place, digging out batteries and wires and the like.

### Assemble Neatly

Appearance and neatness, in assembly and wiring, counts probably just as much in a receiver as correct connections do. No set can be expected to function properly when it is a maze of criss-crossed wiring, and its component parts occupy several square feet of your table. Be careful and neat when you wire our radio receiver and note the improvement.

### C Battery

The use of a G battery in both radio and audio frequency amplifying circuits will not only increase the volume of output from the amplifier but will decrease the amount of plate battery consumption, thus saving B battery. The purpose of the G battery is to maintain a negative bias upon the grids of the amplifier tubes, thus enabling the tube to amplify to its fullest extent. For voltage

up to 40 volts no C battery will be injured, but above this figure one must be used to obtain maximum results.

Below are the correct values of grid biasing on C batteries for corresponding plate voltages to be used with them.

Plate voltage	C Battery
60 volts	1.5 v. to 3 volts
80 "	3 " 4.5 "
100 "	4.5 " 6 "
120 "	6 " 9 "

The correct voltage can be found by trying different voltages until the right one is found. The amount of a C battery are not critical in any case.

When using a V.N. 2014 tube remember that a rheostat having a resistance of at least 20 ohms must be used in conjunction with it. A rheostat of any lower resistance will impair the life of the tube considerably. If a tube is operated at 2 per cent above rated voltage its life is cut in two but if it is operated at 2 per cent below the rated voltage its life is doubled.

**MOLYBDENITE IS IN DEMAND**

Owners of Terrace and Portland  
Canal Deposits May Secure  
Steady Market For Product

In answer to enquiries regarding the market value of molybdenite, and the prospective demand for this mineral received by the Colonization and Development Department of the Canadian National Railways, Winnipegan, an official of that department states that New York quotations during the last two months have been nominal at 65 to 80 cents per pound of molybdenite contained in an eighty-five per cent MoS<sub>2</sub> concentrate, the latest being from 70 to 75 cents. From this must be deducted the duty, amounting to 18 cents per pound on the above grade of ore or concentrate. British quotations are 50 shillings (\$12.50) to 55 shillings (\$13.75) per unit of 22.4 pounds of molybdenite contained in an eighty-five per cent concentrate C.I.F. These prices are low compared to the war price of \$1.10 per pound f.o.b. Ottawa.

Since the war the molybdenite market has been dead, but during this period the beneficial results obtained by using low molybdenite alloy steels has been proved, and during the last year there has been a gradual change for the better and considerable number of prospective users in the steel and chemical industries have been searching for steady supply of the raw material.

### Eastern Mines Open

About six months ago the situation was considered encouraging enough for the owners of the property at Quyon, Que., to reopen their mine and they have been mining and milling ever since, and have, it is understood, sold all their concentrates in the United States at market quotations.
