\$7,000 Set Will be in Operation Next Week at Digby Island

The new continuous wave radio set which is being installed at Digby Island wireless station will be in working order next week, it is officially announced. The cost of this instrument is approximately \$7,000. It is the very latest thing in radio transmission and with it the local station will be able to communicate direct with Vancouver and Victoria and other stations on the coast.

TIMBER RESOURCES DESTROYED BY FIRE

During 1923 there were 189 forest fires which crossed over 56,300 acres, of which 15,900 acres carried saleable timber, and 7,000 acres valuable second growth. These fires caused destruction to forests, logging equipment and other forms of property to the extent of \$255,000. Of these fires 25 per cent were caused by human agency, and were largely preventable.

TANKER HANNA WAS SPLENDIDLY EQUIPPED

The oil tanker R. J. Hanna, owned by the Standard Oil Company, which left port yesterday, is one of the best equipped vessels on the Pacific coast. She is equipped with a gyroscopic compass and an iron mike. This iron mike is set and the ship will follow its course without the aid of a helmsman, the iron working in conjunction with the gyroscopic compass. If the course of the vessel has to be changed, the iron mike is set again. She is also equipped with a direction-finding compass by which directions can be found by wireless. There is said to be only one other merchant ship on the Pacific coast equipped with a gyroscopic compass and an iron mike.

WIGWAM BRINGS TWO SCOWS OF LUMBER

The Wigwam, Capt. Ketchum, arrived last evening about 6 o'clock with two scows of lumber from Georgetown. One scow containing four carloads of lumber for eastern shipment, was landed at the Canadian National lumber dock. The other scow contained lumber for the making of fish boxes which was landed at the fish dock for the Royal and Booth Fisheries. They started early and nearly reached Metlakatla before the wind arose, then they had a hard drive in.
