The explanation for the pilot not being punished is that pilotage is no longer a governmental necessity on this coast. Pilots are placed on vessels only at the discretion of the ship owners and the underwriters. As there is no compulsion about it, there are also no governmental requirements for pilotage qualification. The owners or underwriters may engage any mariner they see fit and he is responsible only to them. The wreck commission cannot deal with pilots as it can with coastwise masters.

Too Many Dogs In This City.

The city council spent the best part of an hour last week discussing the dog catcher's powers. If it had spent a few minutes issuing instructions to the dog catcher it might have been more appropriate.

If people wish to keep dogs, they should not only be compelled to pay the licenses for them but should also be required to take care of them.
