Fourteen Boats Sell 100,000 Pounds at 13.5 to 15.6 Cents

Seven American and seven Canadian boats marketed a total of 108,000 pounds of halibut on the Fish Exchange this morning. Of this total the Americans had 68,500 pounds and the Canadians 39,500.

J. M. Grosart has been succeeded as manager of the Massett Timber Co.'s mill at Buckley Bay by H. E. Dunning. R. R. Maxwell is now logging superintendent instead of A. McCullough. Jack Macdonald, who was accountant at Buckley Bay, has been transferred to the Vancouver office.

The Buckley Bay mill is no longer cutting cant but is turning out one, two and three inch lumber as well as airplane spruce. Seven logging camps are being operated, each employing about 40 men or a total of 280. About 200 men are now employed in the sawmill.
