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

An interesting article published on another page in regard a piano sole while Mr. Herdman to street lighting of the city of Victoria shows that in that city sang "A Friar of Orders Grey. 965 are lights cost the city for operation during the year \$40,164. whereas 1020 clusters of five each incandescent globes cost for PUTTING GRANBY MILL upkeep \$8,448 for the year. In other words the arc lighting PUTTING GRANBY MILL system cost just five times as much as the cluster lights and everyone knows they are much less effective.

The cost of the cluster lighting per standard is \$8.28 a year of which the property owner pays \$3,33 and the city \$4.95. To cover the cost of installation and operation a levy of seven cents a front foot is charged against the property where the

cluster lighting system is in force. This article is not intended as an advocacy of the installation of the cluster lighting system, but is simply drawing attention to facts which may prove useful in connection with any future move that may be made in regard to street lighting.

As new appliances to operate the plant for one week without recharging are evolved so they are tested for their practicability, and being found serviceable are placed into use. That Canadian railroads are not behind those of other countries in the adoption of improved appliances is evidenced the fact that the Canadian Pacific Railway has recently installed electrical Interlocking Plants at all where its rail crossings were unprotected along the line from Montreal to St John, N.B., and at various points elsewhere. These el ctrically operated plants at points where the lines of two companies cross, eliminate all danger of trains crashing into one another at crossings, and considerably facilitate train movements.

Electrically operated interlocking plants have been operated by this Company for many years, although not actually revenue bearing they have afforded an additional degree of safety, which can hardly be reckoned in dollars and cents. As an instance of what these plants are and do:-trains approaching Montreal from all over the continent, with a few exceptions converge at Montreal West, and run over the same tracks from there to Windsor Street Station, a distance of 4. miles. Taking into consideration the empty ones and those given over to freight, it is obvious that hundreds of trains use these tracks daily, and it is to safely govern these trains that three electrical interlocking plants have been installed, at Montreal West, Westmount, and the entrance to Windsor Station.

The track plan, directly over the levers, is electrical lighted, and by watching small light bulbs, the operate is able to mark the approach and progress of all trains A bell rings when an approaching train is within one mis of the plant, and continues to ring until the signal-man lears the signals and sets the switches over the route

The levers operating the switches and signals are so interlocked that a signal cannot be given for a train to pass through the plant until a route for it has been st up, and it is impossible for a conflicting move to be made which would endanger it or any other train. When the operator has cleared a signal the switches are so locks that they cannot be changed until the train has passed over them. Should a train be required to travel over route other than the one originally set up for it, the sign man cannot make the change without operating what a known as the "Time Release", a clockwork mechania which opens and closes electric circuits, unlocking is levers after a time limit of from one to three minute. The speed with which trains may travel over son routes is limited, and the object of the time release is prevent the operator from changing the route so that fast train would proceed over a slow track
