Former Boxing Champ Dies In Australia

NEWCASTLE, Australia (AP)—Dave Sands, British Empire middleweight boxing champion, died in hospital here today from injuries suffered in a truck accident.

Sands, accompanied by his boxing brother, Alfie, was driving a small truck to a timber camp to condition himself for scheduled fights when the truck slid over an embankment.

Sands, 26, was classed as the greatest fighter to emerge from the Australian ring in nearly 40 years. He held the middleweight, light heavyweight and heavyweight titles of Australia.

He won the British Empire middleweight championship by knocking out Dick Turpin in the first round of their fight on September 6, 1949.

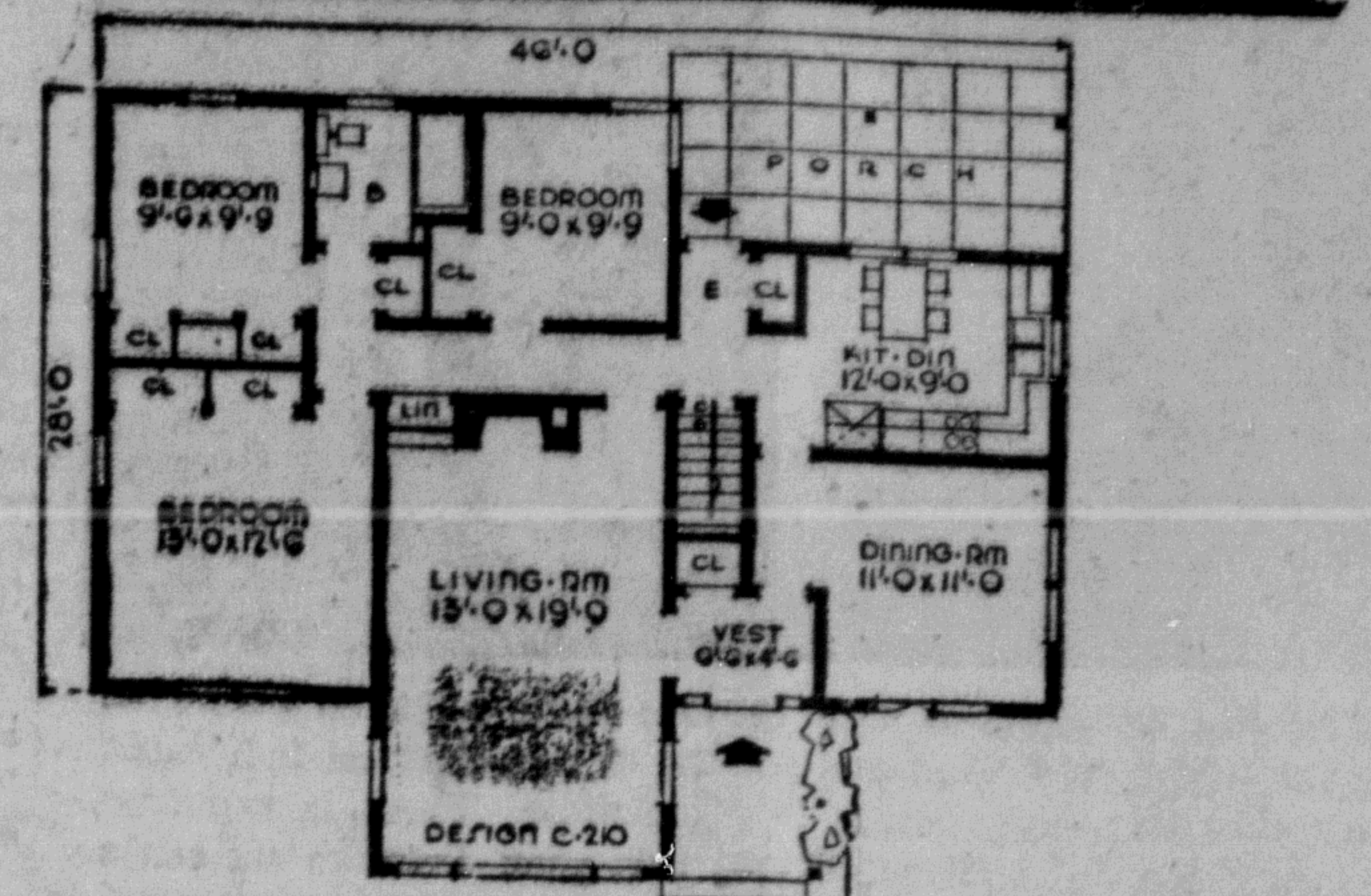
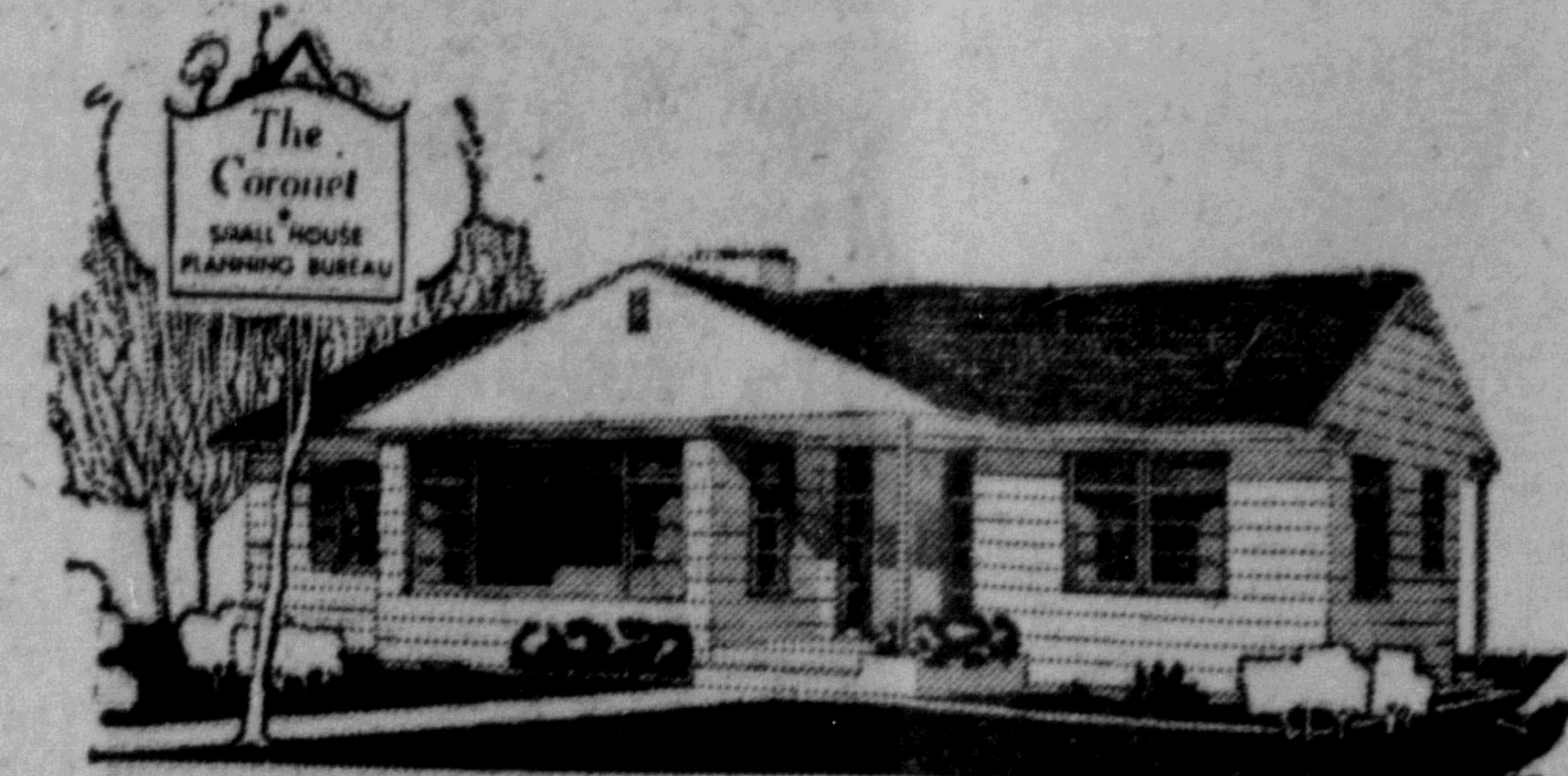

BUILD, REPAIR, PAINT YOUR HOME...



THE CORONET features a plan in which all rooms are corner rooms with the advantage of cross light and ventilation. There are three bedrooms, bath, a separate dining room, combination kitchen-dinette, living room and ten closets.

Closets include wardrobes in the bedrooms, coat closets at the entrances and linen and storage closets in the bedroom hall. Plans also show a covered front entrance, a rear porch overlooking the garden and a full basement. Other interesting features are the fireplace with shelves, picture window, pleasant kitchen arrangement and low exterior roof and wall lines.

The front gable is finished with plywood and the balance of the exterior features wide siding.

Dimensions are 46 feet by 28 feet with the living room extending forward another eight feet. Area is 1,280 square feet. Cubage totals 24,736 cubic feet.

How to Develop Color Scheme For Attractive Home Interior

To combine colors harmoniously in the home, the householder need know only three basic color schemes. These are the monochromatic, adjacent or analogous, and contrasting or complementary.

In a monochromatic scheme, varying tints and shades of a single hue are employed. Using green as the basis for a monochromatic scheme in the living room, the homemaker can choose a medium green rug, light green walls, blue-green or yellow-green draperies and dark green furniture fabrics. A bright red occasional chair and red lamp shades would provide relief. With brown, walls could be ivory, upholstery tan or rust, drapes gold and carpeting brown.

A monochromatic scheme is restful, makes the area in which it is used appear larger, and provides a good backdrop for unusual accessories. It is particularly suited as a background for contemporary-style furnishings with their free form and interesting line.

An adjacent or analogous color scheme, sometimes called "related" color harmony, provides well-modulated variety through colors that have a similarity. Brown and yellow; yellow and green; green and blue; blue and violet; and violet and red are related colors. In a room, an adjacent scheme might have leaf green walls, bright chartreuse draperies, yellow upholstery and Kelly green rug.

VIBRANT SCHEME
The contrasting or complementary scheme employs opposite colors, like red and green; violet and yellow-green; and blue and peach. Contrasting

colors are lively and vibrant. For this reason it is best to use grayed tones instead of intense, bright colors. For example, terra cotta walls, cocoa-brown and beige upholstery and draperies, cocoa-brown carpet; and blue-green accents in smaller areas. The complementary colors here are red-orange and blue-green.

COMBINING COLORS
Combining even the subtlest of shades harmoniously is simple for today's homemaker. Colorizer paints have a range of 1,322 colors, to facilitate development of new and interesting color schemes.

Start with the largest areas of the room and work to the smaller when choosing colors. First select wall and carpet colors, then, according to the type of color scheme to be used, pick harmonizing colors for drapes, upholstery and accessories.

Do not let colors "fight" each other by using them in the same proportions. Pick one color to dominate, then use lesser amounts of secondary colors. To test for proper proportions of two colors to be used together, hold paint sample chips side by side, then cover up different areas of the minor color until satisfied with the color balance between them.

Plan Now to Paint Porch
Plans should be made now for painting the porch of the house, so that work can be done and the porch ready for the family to enjoy it in the mild weather ahead.

Best time to paint the porch is during a dry spell when the ground has a minimum of moisture. To avoid moisture seepage later, coat the underside of floor and steps with fibrated roof coating. If steps are cupped, drill a few half-inch holes in the treads to aid water drainage.

Contract Awards In Canada Reach Billion Dollars

Construction contract awards for the month of July, 1952, standing at \$139,397,000, have bolstered the cumulative total for the first seven months to \$1,044,176,300. While this billion dollar figure indicates the construction volume, it is slightly under the seven month total for the comparable period of last year. The cumulative total for seven months, 1951, stood at \$1,505,128,700.

The figure for July, 1951, in the records of Maclean Building Reports Limited was \$362,822,900 as compared to the July, 1952, figure of \$139,387,000. This represents a decrease for 1952 of \$187,425,900.

Dominion totals for July, 1952, in business, industrial and engineering categories all showed decreases over the same period of last year, while residential increase of \$20,931,100. Comparative figures for July for each category (1951 figures in brackets) were as follows: Residential, \$64,733,600 (\$43,802,500), up \$20,931,100; Business, \$39,252,800 (\$47,372,500), down \$8,119,700; Industrial, \$11,487,500 (\$52,116,400), down \$40,628,900; Engineering, \$23,923,100 (\$183,531,500), down \$159,608,400.

In the Maritimes, the only increases were in the business, \$4,966,600, and engineering, \$1,023,000, categories with respective gains of \$1,737,500 and \$198,000. The figure of \$2,650,400 for residential was down \$834,300, and the industrial total of \$266,500 was down \$15,824,500.

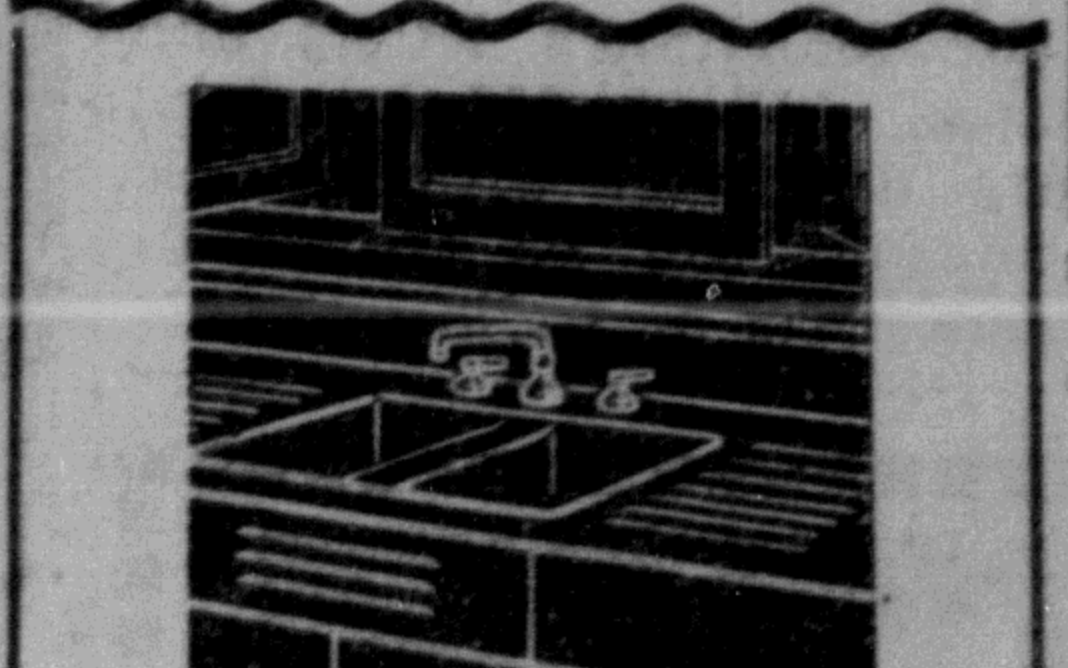
In Quebec, industrial construction was the only category which showed an increase, with the total standing at \$3,885,400, up \$611,400. The balance of Quebec construction contracts were as follows: Residential, \$10,054,700, down \$358,400; Business, \$8,751,000, down \$6,984,400; Engineering, \$3,003,800, down \$1,497,100.

Ontario showed a total increase of \$2,306,500 for July, 1952, which was accountable for by the \$16,635,900 increase in the residential category. Decreases of \$3,250,600 (business), \$9,682,000 (industrial) and \$1,396,800 (engineering) were not large enough to overbalance the increase.

IN THE WEST
Construction contract awards for the western section of the country were as follows: Residential, \$14,343,500, up \$5,487,900; Business, \$11,909,700, up \$377,800; Industrial, \$717,400, down \$15,733,800; Engineering, \$15,333,400, down \$156,912,500. These figures totalled a decrease of \$166,780,600 for the section.

Residential construction heads the list in the "Big Jobs of the Month," with 147 houses in Edmonton, \$1,238,000; a Toronto apartment, \$1,000,000; 73 houses in Ancaster, Ont., \$1,022,000; 65 houses in Leveck, Ont., \$1,200,000; 10 apartments in Dixie, Ont., \$2,000,000; 360 houses in Dixie, Ont., \$7,500,000; 266 houses in Kitchener, Ont., \$2,783,000; 152 duplexes in St. Johns, Nfld., \$1,500,000; 21 cold

water flats in St. Laurent, Que., \$1,500,000; and apartments in Petawawa, Ont., \$1,003,419. Other big jobs include a \$5,570,615 bridge in Vancouver; a \$1,100,000 dock and grain elevator in Vancouver; a \$1,000,000 sewage disposal plant in Oshawa, Ont.; a \$2,000,000 factory in Toronto; a \$3,000,000 office building in Toronto; a \$1,000,000 proof range in Nicolet, Que.; a \$2,600,000 airport development in St. Johns, Nfld.; a \$1,300,000 plant addition in Montreal, and a \$1,381,377 hangar at Camp Borden, Ont.
