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### TRADES AND LABOR MEETING LAST NIGHT

Objection Taken to Flat Rate of Paying Workmen's Compensation

There was a large attendance at the regular meeting of the Trades & Labor Council last night. In the absence of President S. D. Macdonald, Vice-President W. M. Brown was in the chair. Many communications were read and there was a good deal of routine business conducted.

The legislative committee was instructed to make representations to the legislature with a view to obtaining better administration of the Workmen's Compensation Act. The request is being made to have provision made to cover the cost of caring for patients throughout their disability instead of continuing the present system of paying a flat rate of \$2.50 a day.

The proposed provincial labor party was discussed but no action was taken.

Respecting the manufacture and sale of oleo-margarine, two resolutions were before the meeting for endorsement—one from Ottawa favoring it and the other from Edmonton opposing it. After a long discussion, the Edmonton resolution was endorsed.

The nation wide idea that counsel should be appointed by the government to defend men who were charged with trivial offences but who had no means to defend themselves was endorsed.

It was decided that minutes should be exchanged with various outside Trades and Labor Councils.

### HOUSE NEAR EDMONTON SAID TO BE HAUNTED

Peculiar Noises Heard by Many People Who Tried to Live There

The Haunted House of the Two Hills is well known to many people in the city, says the Edmonton Journal. Situated about two miles south of Strathcona on the border of a drained lake once known as the Lake of the Two Hills, this particular structure is the centre of many weird tales.

The house was built about 30 years ago, by a Mr. Meredith, who came here from Toronto. At his death Mr. Meredith's body was removed to his home town, and Messrs. Osler, Hammond and Nanton, of Winnipeg, in charge of the estate, advised their agent in Strathcona to rent the house.

One or two families lived in the building, but soon left, complaining of "noises in the night," and the house was empty for some time.

#### Family Did Not Stay Long

Then a family who had come by prairie schooner from Washington, agreed to take the house, rent free, for a month. No ghost could terrify them, they declared. It was not long after the family

moved in, however, until the "noises" began to bother them. Harness in an adjoining room to the one in which they slept was violently shaken, footsteps could be heard in an unfinished attic, and the Washington family left after but a few days' residence, satisfied that the house was really haunted.

The next step in the little drama was the appointment by the citizens of Strathcona of an investigating committee. A party of perhaps a dozen, many of whom are still living here, went down one night, armed with guns, revolvers, blankets and a wee drop of Scotch "for the nerves."

After waiting some time and hearing nothing, the party prepared to spend the night. Blankets were spread on the floor, but as soon as the lights were put out the noises commenced. There was a sound as of someone walking back and forth in the room above, then a pause, and the sound of rustling papers. This continued at intervals, throughout the night.

#### Sprinkled Flour on Floor

On the following evening, another party went down. This time flour was sprinkled on the floor. The events of the night before were repeated; the floor above creaked audibly under the tread of footsteps. In the morning, however, the flour bore no marks or evidence of human beings having walked over it.

Altogether about thirty persons visited the house, but not one could give an explanation as to the cause of the strange phenomena. All were quite satisfied an animal was not responsible, there was no wind, and a thorough search resulted in the finding of no wires or anything that could in any way account for the strange events which had transpired.
