FORMER LOCAL MAN WAS PRINCIPAL IN RACE WITH DEATH

David Greenwood Drifted Down Fraser River in Icy Tempest With Dead Companion, George Watts

David Greenwood, who is said to have resided for ten years in Prince Rupert, figured as the principal in a thrilling race with death on the Fraser River last week. His companion, George Watts, having fallen ill while employed on a dredge near Chilliwack, Greenwood undertook to take him by rowboat to the hospital at New Westminster. Greenwood lost control of his little craft in a furious storm and the boat drifted down the river in the freezing night and finally went ashore on Matsqui Island. Rescuers found Watts dead and Greenwood in an unconscious condition. The latter is now making a rapid recovery at the Mission Hospital.
