**Victoria Will Help Press Senate Reform.**

Rather unexpectedly the British Columbia Legislature is being asked to aid in the fight for Senate reform. Capt. Ian Mackenzie of Vancouver is bringing a resolution before the House asking it to go on record in regard to the matter and it is likely that there will be some lively sparring over it.

While Senate reform is a federal matter, the provincial legislatures can help bring it about through bringing influence to bear.

It is to be hoped that the Victoria House will be a unit in its opposition to the present system which injures each party in turn, whenever there is a change of government.

**By All Means Sell P.G.E. Railway.**

The government is asking for power to sell the P.G.E. If they can dispose of it, the province will benefit by the action. The giving of land grants is now generally acknowledged to be the best method of financing, as the railway company is more anxious than anyone else to get those lands colonized in order that the line may pay. The railway has means of getting settlers on the land through its immense organization, which the ordinary individual or government does not have.

It is to be hoped that John Oliver and his government will succeed in putting through a deal for the line.

**Civic Spirit Is Not Always In Evidence.**

A proper civic spirit is not always in evidence. There are in Prince Rupert many loyal men and women who both in season and out stand up for Prince Rupert and guard her interests. Usually they are the permanent residents. There are too always in a young town many who are only sojourners and whose hearts are in the south. They sometimes forget that they are earning their bread here and take every opportunity to decry the city, its climate, its people and its institutions. They do a great deal of harm to the place.

If a place is good enough for young men and young women to earn their livings in, it should be their duty to speak well of it. If they could have done better in the south, doubtless they would have remained there. To take advantage of the opportunities here, even temporarily, and then to decry the place, is very poor form and should not be tolerated. What we need here is men and women who will devote themselves to bettering the city instead of complaining at the lack of privileges.

**EXPECTS TO GIVE BETTER BOAT SERVICE**

**B. C. Keeley Assures Board of Trade of Interest in this Port**

B. C. Keeley, Pacific coast superintendent of C.G.M.M., Vancouver, in a letter read at the Board of Trade meeting last night on the question of continuing the steamer Prince John service to the Queen Charlotte Islands, stated that the winter schedule of steamers had been drawn up to have the Prince John operate out of Prince Rupert, and everything possible was being done to get another steamer to permit of the John continuing in her regular service. Mr. Keeley assured the board that Prince Rupert was not being overlooked in the question of transportation and he hoped that before long he would be able to give the people in the north an even better service than in the past.
