Another Japanese Ship Is Lost at Sea and 169 Persons go down on her

TOKIO, July 28. - One hundred and sixty-nine persons were drowned in the wrecked steamer Tairei Maru off Cape Notoro last night, says a despatch received here. The vessel which is a freighter but which was on a trip carrying passengers, is believed to have struck a rock, but a second despatch says it was due to a collision with the steamer Kamibura Maru. All aboard the ship were Japanese. The dead comprise 138 passengers and a crew of 54. Eighteen of the passengers and five members of the crew survive, reaching Toyohara in lifeboats.
