Secretary Denby Resigns from President Coolidge's Cabinet Result Teapot Dome Scandals

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Edwin B. Denby has resigned as secretary of navy in the cabinet of Pres. Coolidge and his resignation has been accepted. The decision followed a conversation with President Coolidge in which all the latest aspects of the naval oil leasing program was reviewed. The secretary's retirement makes the first break in the official family of President Coolidge. Denby was one of the original members of the late President Harding's cabinet. The retirement of Secretary Denby has also revived rumors that the resignation of Attorney General Daughtery will follow in a few
