TWO VIEWS ON LABOR VICTORY

Bishop of London and George Lansbury Writes on the Situation

Two interesting views on the labor situation as seen in Great Britain today are from the London Times. The Bishop of London says:

"The war, with all its horrors, did bring out unsuspected nobility in man. There was a glory in those days of heroism, and we must see to it that it does not die out in the light of common day. Humanity was seen to be capable of a self-sacrifice and a power of uniting together, and a contempt of comfort which would have seemed an impossible miracle in softer days. Why then should we think it impossible to kindle this spark again? and why should we despair of the Republic because, a Labor Government will for the first time in our history take in hand governing the State? Why! these are the very men whose comrades died in their thousands for their country, and who, most of them, if the matter was looked into, 'did their bit' with the rest. It is quite true that they will especially need our prayers in what is an untried task to many, but they should also receive our generous sympathy and a fair trial."

Wide View of Labor

George Lansbury, one of the labor leaders who was overlooked by Premier Macdonald says: "I have always held, and in fact in discussion with Lenin when in Russia argued, that our British Labor movement was different from any other Labor movement in the world, inasmuch as within our ranks are to be found men and women of every class, who are aiding us in the great task of striving to reconstruct society. We divide those who are opposed to us more effectively that we ourselves are divided. Therefore, it is imperative that during this coming session, everybody who has a hand in the working of the Constitution should be scrupulously fair to Mr. Macdonald and his colleagues in order that we may once and for all demonstrate that the British constitution has been built up for the service of the nation, and not for the perpetuation of a class."

Not Class Party

"And may I say finally: I deny altogether that in the true sense of the word we of the Labor movement are a 'class' party. Carlyle once said that the only class that was not a class was the working class; and as we have founded our party on the basis of brain and hand workers, it seems to me impossible to deal with us as if we were trying to establish a class supremacy. As a matter of fact, when our policy is carried out in all its fullness, class distinctions, class dominations will be swept away, because class will no longer exist."

PARSON URGES MORE SYMPATHY WITH YOUNG PEOPLE BY THE ELDERS

VICTORIA, Feb. 18. — The chasm between the younger generation and their elders will widen into a hopeless breach and the church will lose a whole generation of educated young folks unless something is done to bridge the gulf, says Dr. Clem Davies.

Revolution, according to this authority, is evolution speeded up and the past ten years has brought about social and religious revolutions. Dr. Davies thinks that have taken the young people unawares. Many of the things that young people are blamed for today are brought about by conditions which their elders instituted.

"The thing to do with our young people is not to stand off and criticise them. The world today is a great maelstrom and our young people have been thrown into the stream and some of them cannot swim and those who can don't know where to go, many of them and it is a suicidal policy for elders to criticise the youngsters without offering any solution," he says.

The young people of today show little inclination to follow the established social and theological paths, hence they have been called "godless," "flappery," "jazzy," "superficial," and called so by people who ought to be more sympathetic and discriminating. Some or even most of the tendencies in modern youth, thinks the pastor, may be healthy if turned into proper channels.

TOWER OF BABEL IN SAN FRANCISCO CITY

Telephone Exchange There Has to Cater to all Dialects of Chinese

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18. — San Francisco's "Tower of Babel" is a telephone exchange set in the midst of its world famous Chinatown. This exchange is the only one in America devoted exclusively to Chinese patrons.

The exchange has 4,463 lines to serve the 10,000 Chinese inhabitants of this district. The operators are Chinese girls, 13 in number. All must speak, read and write English, but more important, they are familiar with several native Chinese dialects, for China as a nation is a great unwieldy empire that is a babel of tongues.

The 13 girls handle an average of 11,000 calls daily, nearly all inter-Chinatown service. The girls must remember names, numbers and addresses, because the bulk of the calls are made by name and not by number. All the girls are graduates of San Francisco schools. Loo Kum Shoo, the manager, was graduated from the University of California.

Another peculiarity of the service is that there are absolutely no party lines in Chinatown. Though recognized as scrupulously honest, the Chinese is very secretive by nature and demands an individual line.

TRANSMITS THOUSAND WORDS IN A MINUTE BY UTILIZING LIGHT

LONDON, Feb. 18. — Striking evidence of the advancement made in invention during 1923 is found in the recent exhibit of telegraphic and other instruments at the British Imperial College of Science and Technology. The most notable development is in telegraphy; delay in submarine cabling has been largely eliminated by utilizing the action of light on selenium, which responds so rapidly that the signal sent out is recorded even before the full current has passed over the wire.

A magnetic telegraphic drum recorder is shown, capable of speeding up messages to 1,000 words a minute. This is effected by a current of the incoming signal passing through coils contained in a rapidly revolving iron drum and turning it into a magnet for a brief space, this attracting a slight piece of iron, shaped like a horse shoe. This operates a fine syphon tube charged with ink, causing it to record the signal on the paper tape as it flies past it.
