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

Race track betting is on the increase. Figures just issued say that in British Columbia alone the amount bet on the parimutuel system amounted this year to over six and a quarter million dollars. That is a huge sum to be diverted from the regular avenues of trade. It is a lot of money for people to lose and also for people to win. The people who lose can often ill afford it and to the people who win it is of little use for they blow it in just as carelessly as they won it.
