Difference Of Opinion Over Use Of Herring.

There seems to be a difference of opinion as to whether herring and other fish should be used for the manufacture of Thomas Andrews, John Shirley, fish meal, gelatin and other fish products. There is a factory C. W. Homer, H. T. Willett, W adjacent to the city where such work is carried on, the fish offal C. Orchard, G. A. Woodland, E. being used also in the manufacture of fertilizer.

The question that arises is whether the use of herring in reduction plants would tend to exterminate the fish. In Alaska the factories use all kinds of fish but here, until recently, permission has been witheld. Just a short time ago an order was passed granting the necessary permission but influences have been brought to bear to try to have the order rescinded.

It is pointed out that in the manufacture of fish meal, gelatin and the numerous other products from fish as well as in the making of fertilizer from the offal, there is more labor expended than in using the fish in any other way and the pro- stitute). ducts become more valuable. The only difficulty seems to be that the use of herring in that way may possibly deplete the bait supply.


