### OPIUM GROWING IS BEING PROMOTED IN SOME PARTS OF CHINA

PEKIN, Jan. 29 .- Opium-growing is being promoted vigorously in several sections of China and the government appears to be helpless in its efforts to suppress the industry, which during the past few months has grown to vast proportions. In many districts the trade apparently has semi-official approval on account of its revenue-producing possibilities. A proclamation has been issued

stating that orders have been received from the military and civil governors of Incheng province to the effect that the police and magistrate should jointly establish what is to be known as the Opium Prohibition Investigation Office. As a matter of fact, this office will sell licenses to anyone for the transport of opium within the bounds of Incheng jurisdiction for twelve cents an ounce.

Poppy seeds are being sown in many districts of western Honan. Efforts of Chinese officials to profit from the opium trade are meeting with a wave of opposition from growers and others who are forced as a result of the recent developments to pay increased taxes.

Acres of Poppy

Last spring, when the growing of the poppy plant was not officially permitted in Honan province, one had only to go out into the country in order to see acre upon acre of the weed in cultivation. Even then the illegal business of opium production was winked at, but since then official proclamations have been issued. permitting the growing of the poppy. Farmers are encouraged to plant it on payment of a fee to the officials, and thus wheat production is discouraged while the military lords are replenished.


