## CONGREGATION IS DISTURBED

One of Elders and Lady of Congregation Take Exception to Remarks of Pastor

### EXPRESSED VIEWS

Preacher Told That What he Was Saying Was Not According to Fact

(Mail Correspondence)  
KINGSTON, April 30.—It is not often that members of a church congregation talk back at the preacher, but that is what happened here on Easter Sunday. Two of the members of Cooke's Presbyterian Church took exception to some remarks made by their pastor, Rev. T. J. S. Ferguson, in regard to Church Union. They rose from their seats and expressed themselves in no uncertain terms, causing quite a scene. Feeling runs high here in regard to Church Union and the opposition are very pronounced in their views.

### Easter Message

Mr. Ferguson had commenced his Easter message, and during the course of his remarks he switched on to the question of Church Union, in which he is very much interested. He made reference to the fact that the members of the Presbyterian Church who are opposed to Church Union had circulated cards and asked the signatures of those who were in accord with the wording to be placed on the cards and returned to the anti-union committee. The remarks which Mr. Ferguson made in connection with this question did not appeal to one of the elders of the church, and he stood to his feet and told the pastor something to the effect that the statements which he had just uttered were not according to facts, and that he did not think that Easter morning was the time to discuss Church Union.

### Expressed Disapproval

After this elder had spoken, a lady who has been a member of the church for many years, expressed her disapproval of the pastor taking on the question of Church Union in the church in view of the fact that all the members of the congregation were not in accord with his views on the question. She suggested that if Mr. Ferguson thought that the Church Union question should be considered, it would be advisable for him to call a meeting for the purpose of discussing this question, and only those who were interested in the topic would be present. For a few minutes there was quite an interesting time, but Cooke's pastor continued his sermon. It is a well-known fact that Rev. Mr. Ferguson is a strong advocate of Church Union and on several occasions since coming to Kingston has expressed his views from the pulpit of the church.
