Grain Exporter Looks Over Local Situation with view to Possible Erection of Grain Elevator here

"I am going to the prairies to interview some of the grain dealers there to see if I can make them as enthusiastic about the possibility of shipping grain through the port of Prince Rupert as I am myself," stated C. P. Coles of the firm of Kerr-Gifford Co., grain exporters of Portland, Oregon.

Mr. Coles arrived yesterday on the Prince Rupert and has spent his time here looking over suggested elevator sites and conferring with officials and particularly with A. E. Warren, general manager of western lines of the Canadian National Railway, with F. G. Dawson, director of the railway and with R. Beaumont, superintendent of the C.G.M.M. here. He has all the appearance of being a keen business man and he refuses to commit himself to anything except that he is looking over the situation with a view to the erection of an elevator here and that before doing anything he will have to confer with his associates and secure all available data. He is going east over the railway to Calgary and other prairie points and will there confer with grain men on the possibility of establishing an exporting business through the port of Prince Rupert.

FRANCE SHOULD ABANDON POLICY

London Paper Says She Must do so Before There Can be Improvement

DRIVING TO CHAOS
LONDON, Jan. 31.—The exchange of letters between Premier Ramsay MacDonald and Premier Poincare regarding the Anglo-French understanding evokes little newspaper comment. The Liberal press believes improvement is impossible until France abandons her present attitude toward Germany. The Daily News says Britain's task is to persuade France that there are better ways of safeguarding herself than in controlling Germany's western railways and reducing Europe to ultimate chaos.

NEW MINISTER FROM QUEBEC

Hon. J. A. Cardin is Lawyer and Has Been in Parliament Since 1911

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—Pierre Joseph Arthur Cardin, member for Richelieu, who has been selected to succeed Hon. Ernest Lapointe as minister of marine, is a French Canadian both by birth and ancestry. He was born at Sorel on June 28, 1879, and was educated at private schools there. He studied law at Laval University and obtained his degree there. He was first elected to the House of Commons at the general election in 1911 and was re-elected in 1912 after being unseated. He was successful again in 1917 and 1921. He is a lawyer and a Roman Catholic and makes his home in Sorel.

RELINQUISH SEARCH ESCAPED PRISONER

VICTORIA, Jan. 31.—The police who have been searching the woods in the vicinity of Duncan for George Hannay, a man who escaped from Duncan jail Sunday night, are abandoning the hunt in the belief that the fugitive succeeded in escaping from the Vancouver Island to the mainland, it is reported here. The posse making the search included five officers of the provincial force from this city and officers from Nanaimo and Duncan.

ACCIDENT OCCURS AT TOTEM POLE CORNER

Ford Car Badly Smashed, Driver Receives Painful Lacerations and Occupants Minor Injuries

Hayner Bros. Ford taxi had its windshield and top torn off, the driver of the car, Ernest Stacey, received painful but not serious lacerations about the eyes and mouth, and two passengers, Jas. Eastwood and Joe Grace, escaped with minor injuries when the car last evening about seven o'clock ran into a wire cable stretched half way across Second Avenue at the corner of Second Street. The wire had been stretched from the totem pole which is being erected at the intersection of the streets to the sidewalk and it was just low enough to catch the car in the dark. The consequences of the accident might easily have been more serious.

According to J. R. Mitchell of Mitchell & Currie, contractors putting up the pole, a red light had been left to mark the stretched wire. The driver reported to the police that he had not seen the light. A resident in the neighborhood told the police that the light had been burning. In any case it went out after the impact but it was not long afterwards that several were put up to ensure against further accidents.

At the time of the accident, the driver was taking his two fares to the Grand Trunk Pacific wharf to board the steamer Prince John.
Several other motorists reported to the police that they had narrowly averted a collision with the obstacle.

MINISTER TO WASHINGTON

Premier King Says Question Has Not Been Considered Since First of Year

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—That the Canadian government is not at present considering the appointment of a minister at Washington was indicated in a statement last night by Premier King in relation to reports connecting the name of Sir Arthur Currie with the proposed post. "During the present year," said the premier, "the question of an appointment of a representative at Washington has not been considered." The reports evidently refer to rumors current some time ago.

HOCKEY FINALS SUNDAY NEXT

Canadians Are Favorites and It is Expected She Will Play United States

CHAMONIX, Jan. 31.—The Canadians are two to one favorites in the hockey championship tournament that is going on here in connection with the Olympic games. The finals will be played on Sunday and it is probable that the contenders on that occasion will be Canada and the United States. Canada won all her games by big margins, neither one of her opponents making so much as a single goal.
United States defeated Great Britain eleven to nothing today thus reaching the semi-finals. France defeated Belgium 7 to 5.

HALIBUT TOTAL FOR MONTH 1,670,000 LBS.

Due to Very Stormy Weather Prevailing Almost all January, Figure Less Than Last Year

Fish landings at the port of Prince Rupert during the month of January including today's sales totalled 1,670,500 pounds as against 1,906,000 pounds in January last year. The main reason for the lower quantity was because of very bad weather which allowed of only one week's normal fishing in the entire month. The highest price for the month was 24 1/2c and the lowest, 13.6c.

MRS. KIRKWOOD OF STEWART IS DEAD

Was 85 Years of Age and Had Resided in Northern Mining Camp For Twelve Years

Mrs. Catherine Kirkwood of Stewart, aged 88, died in Victoria last week after a brief illness.
