GYRO BALL WAS BRIGHT AFFAIR

Prince Rupert's Newest Community Service Organization Achieves Great Social Success

Brilliant decorative effects, ingenious novelty devices, many new and lovely gowns and a general air of conviviality made the first annual ball of the Gyro Club of Prince Rupert, held in the Auditorium last night, an affair that, in social success, has never been outdone in the city. Lending further to this effect was the arrangement of white cakes with red candles which were lighted as the supper commenced. A profusion of bunting, flags and Gyro emblems on ceiling and walls filled out the general scheme of decorations.

Members Served

At midnight, serving of refreshments commenced, Gyro members taking charge. Colored paper hats and caps were set at each place lending much to the general effect both at the tables and afterwards on the floor. Mrs. Carrall was in charge in the kitchen.

With the opening of the second half of the program, the surprise novelty features of the ball were inaugurated. Paper streamers and confetti were introduced and balloons were released from the ceiling floating to the dancers below who enthusiastically grasped for them as they came in reach. The scene was then like one often seen in the movies but seldom seen in Prince Rupert. Merriment waxed high and continued till the close of the ball.

Music for the early part of the evening was supplied by an orchestra consisting of Miss N. Pryce, A. A. Easson, Howard White and Kenny Rood. At 11 o'clock Gyro Charlie Balagno arrived with members of the Westholme orchestra, seven pieces thereafter dispensing melodious strains to the delectation of the appreciative dancers.
