Britain Returns To Conservative Policy.

The people of Great Britain have spoken and they have said that they want to refrain from venturing on the unknown seas where they were sailing under a radical administration. They wish to have their feet on the earth.

Now it will be for the Conservatives to take up the work where Ramsay Macdonald left off and to carry out such reforms! as will be for the benefit of that country without undertaking experiments in nationalizing of the mines and in too close an association with Soviet Russia.

Macdonald Showed Himself Statesman.

We have every admiration for J. Ramsay Macdonald, the defeated premier. He is a statesman and may yet come back after having learned the lesson of moderation. His foreign policy generally has been a splendid thing for Britain and an object lesson to the world. Taken as a whole the Labor government has been a successful experiment and much can be learned from it. It was restrained by the fact that the Liberals held the whip hand all the time and refused to support radical policies which seemed to them unwise. During the short life of the government, its members learned lessons in restraint which they will never forget and the advanced radicals have learned that they can never hope to go faster than the mass of the people will allow.

Sir Henry Thornton And Railway Rates.

Sir Henry Thornton is asking for a thorough revision of the railway rates throughout the country. In that he shows himself a wise administrator. There has to be a revision. The people of the West will not continue to suffer a handicap such as that under which they now rest.

Sir Henry sax's freight rates must be looked at from the national aspect and not from the point of view of any one section. That is true. If a person were studying the question from Mars would be see justice in there being a higher rate westbound than eastbound when the railway grades westbound are better than those to the east? Sir Henry is right in mentioning that there is a dividing line between east and west and that dividing line must be set in a just manner and not arbitrarily as at present with the object of giving the east an advantage.
