HEAD OF ARMY IS AN ATHLETE

Commander Evangeline Booth Rides Horseback, Swims Like a Seal, Skates, and Sleeps Outdoors

Those who are interested in the Salvation Army and its work, may be interested to know that its head, Commander Evangeline Booth, was a cripple child suffering from curvature of the spine and that after being given up by all the doctors she cured herself by taking exercise and living the outdoor life. The story of this is told this month in Physical Culture.

Today Commander Booth rides horseback, sleeps in the open summer and winter, plays tennis, and in summer her bathing suit is never dry while in winter she keeps fit by skating. She says she likes to swim a mile or two across the river and breakfast on the other side. She once swam five miles in rough water, and one of the feats she has accomplished is swimming a mile or two while at the same time writing a letter without letting the paper get wet.

As well as living this strenuous life Commander Booth does an immense amount of work. She addresses meetings where thousands of people have gathered. In order to do this she finds it necessary to regulate her food, avoiding meats as much as possible and eating largely fish, vegetables and boiled rice. She says:

 "Overeating is one of the great curses of modern living. I can sense a deep relationship between digestion and politics, and I know that all too often the fate of nations swing in the balance of a surgical operation. Statesmen who are weaving the destinies of nations neglect their own systems and many times when a man is at the height of his career and fashioning policies that will aid suffering humanity, his stomach succumbs to nights of heavy and wrong eating and all his nascent achievements perish on the operating table. Historians call it fate, but those who can read between the lines know it was a case of misdirected appetite."

FARM CHILDREN ARE FREE FROM DISEASE

Only Ten Per Cent Have Tuberculosis Infection Compared With Much Higher Number in Cities

ATLANTA, May 7.—The results of the examination of 1465 school children in four prosperous farming countries of Minnesota show that only a little over ten per cent of these children showed positive signs of tuberculosis infection. This statement made by Dr. S. A. Slater, superintendent of the Southwestern Minnesota Sanatorium at Worthington, Minn., is, as pointed out by him, in sharp contrast with the results obtained by investigators in large cities where as many as 98 per cent of the children examined were found to be infected.
