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Railway Rates And This Province.

It seems that what is needed is a thorough revision of the whole system of railway rates which will put British Columbia on an equality in the matter of mileage with other parts of Canada. We now have the business to offer but it cannot be done if the rates are discriminatory.

PEON OF PRAISE FOR MODERN WOMAN FROM AN ENGLISH OCTOGENARIAN

War Offered Opportunity for Her to Find Her Freedom Says Poet-philosopher

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The modern girl, whose ways not infrequently shock her elders nowadays, has a staunch defender in Edward Carpenter, the poet and philosopher, who renounced wealth and position half a century ago to become a socialistic pioneer.

Four score years have given Mr. Carpenter ample opportunities for observing the ways of women, and he now celebrates his eightieth birthday with a paean in praise of the girl of the twentieth century. "While I am overwhelmed at the incapacity of the average man, I have nothing but admiration for the modern woman," said Mr. Carpenter.

Limited Lives "I remember the women of the last generation and their limited lives. Dabbling with water colors, doing a little embroidery, and having no opinions whatever used to be considered not only a suitable, but the only life for a girl. In those days, if a girl had opinions on anything more important than her dresses, she was considered a freak by other girls, and heavily sat on by the married women.

"The war offered the opportunity at the psychological moment for women to find her freedom. Now all the problems that she has to face arise from the fact that she still is obliged to conform to certain standards that were intended for a totally different creature, the woman of yesterday.

"One of the most striking differences between this generation and the last is the way in which women say what they mean with what used to be masculine directness. They once seemed to make a point of saying what they did not mean. I never knew why this was so.

"Altogether this is a hopeful age. Things are moving in the right direction, towards more freedom and a more sensible outlook. The curse of the age is lack of seriousness. I believe women will do much towards putting the world straight again."

COMMUNISTS DECREASE EUROPEAN COUNTRIES

LONDON, Oct. 16.—Membership of the Communist party in European countries is diminishing rapidly, according to statistics recently published by Justice, the English Communist organ. The membership decline in Europe is shown by the following figures:

The total membership of the party, outside Russia, which was given as 1,064,000 in 1920, dropped to 674,142 in 1922 and 599,990 in 1924.

The paper adds that the only countries where the Communists still retain an important place in the working class movement is in Germany, Czechoslovakia and France. In Germany it is only the subsidies received from Russia that keeps the party strength at normal, the paper adds.

ENGLAND STILL LIKES BEEF.

LONDON, Eng.—Modern Englishmen are living up to the title of beef-eaters which their habits in the pre-Victorian era assigned to them. Londoners are big meat eaters, particularly of beef, and last year an average of 37.9 ounces of meat a head was sold each week in London.

IS YOUNGEST OFFICIAL OF CANADIAN PACIFIC

Leo Solloway, recently appointed Asiatic Freight Agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway with office at Montreal and supervision over Oriental and Australasian traffic via Pacific Ports.

Born in Vancouver in 1895, Mr. Solloway has the distinction now being the youngest official in Canadian Pacific service, a distinction which he has won through fourteen years' service in the freight department of the Company. He commenced work as stenographer in the steamship department of the General Freight office in Vancouver in 1910, and remained in that department until 1915 when he enlisted for active service with the 72nd Highlanders.

He returned from overseas in the Fall of 1917 and was attached to the steamship department in Vancouver until 1918 when he was loaned to the British Ministry of Shipping, acting as assistant to the agent of the Ministry at the Pacific port.

In June 1919, Mr. Solloway went to Montreal as chief clerk to the Asiatic Freight Agent. Two years later he was appointed chief clerk to the General Foreign Freight Agent, and last May appointed as Acting Asiatic Freight Agent which office has been confirmed by promulgation.
