A proposal made by Sam Jabour that the Postmaster be asked to use a cancelling stamp on letters advertising this city was passed on to the publicity committee for report to the next meeting, by the Board of Trade last night.

At the suggestion of H. F. Pullen it was decided by the Board of Trade last night to invite the Canadian Press Association party which meets in convention in Vancouver early in June to visit this city either going or coming.
