Doings of the Mosquito Fleet which is the chief source of Prince Rupert's prosperity

The admiral of the Mosquito fleet reports that halibut fares during the week have been light which is accounted for in great measure by the American boats having been "bunched" recently.

The halibut landings for the first three days of the week proved meagre but on Thursday they took an upward spurt when four American and four Canadian boats landed 95,250 pounds. Prices offered on the Fish Exchange took a jump on Tuesday when Canadian fares picked off 21c. for first class and 10c. for second class fish, the highest price of the year. Boats of the home fleet have been arriving in greater numbers and have brought in fair catches. The first salmon landing of the season was made on Wednesday when the First Place, Capt. Geo. Place, brought in 300 pounds of the delicious table delicacy which sold at 18.5c and 2c. The deep sea boys state that while the weather on the high spots has not been of the best, it has materially improved over conditions existing the previous week. One fur arrival has been reported during the week. The local waterfront shipyards and ways are well occupied and considerable boat building and repair work is on hand.

Now that the salmon has appeared on the market a number of the smaller boats are getting a hustle on to be out and doing. Cow Bay is resounding with the whack of hammers and the zip of saws and the junior branch of the service will soon be out in full force. A number of the salmon fishers will be leaving port over the week end to try their luck.

Considerable repair work is being carried out to the gridiron at the Prince Rupert Yacht Club premises. New uprights are being put in place by the assistant commodore. Several boats of the pleasure fleet are to go on the "grid" for copper painting and other necessary hull repairs in readiness for the coming balmy days and evenings.

The power boat Taplow, owned by Brown and Flewin of Port Simpson, which has recently had a 12-15 horse power engine installed at the dry dock, left for the northern port early in the week. The Taplow will engage in the salmon packing business during the coming season.

Boats of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s fleet have been meeting with considerable success in seining for herring in the harbor during the week. It

has also been reported that the herring are running well down the coast and the Captain's Cove and Jap Inlet pounds are being well filled.

The launch Oh Baby has been out recently. Skipper Myhill Jones reports having been as far south as the Gardner Canal district and out to Kitkatla on commercial business. The Oh Baby is now undergoing her annual overhaul in preparation for the regular summer schedule. It is expected the overhaul will be completed within the next three or four days.

Another Rat Tale
This is a new sort of rat tale, or story, and the truth of it is vouched for by no less a personage than Jimmy Lee, the popular manager of the Atlin Fisheries. The story concerns Jimmy Holden, a respected employee of the fish house. Anyone so gifted could almost make a pun on the name because it is all about "holden" a rat. Having got the preliminaries of the yarn in our bean the dirty work will now commence:

It was early on a clear and foggy morning during the week that Jimmy Holden arrived on the job to light the fires and get steam up for the day's rush of business. Of course at such an unearthly hour Jimmy was sort of befogged around the optics and could not discern objects as clearly as might have been the case after lunch. Our hero started in to poke around the furnace room for some paper, which is the usual procedure when about to light a fire, and seeing a bundle of brown paper, as he thought, he came to the conclusion that the efforts of his search had been duly awarded. As rats do not make the best of fire-lighter Jim was quick to let it go and thereupon made a dash for the tool chest. Torberg Brings Fur
The only fur arrival reported for the week was the power boat Torberg, Capt. Nels Roberson. Nels brought in a fine fur catch including some splendid specimens of otter. Just where the fur bearers were caught is the skipper's special secret. The catch found a ready local market.

McLean Yards Active
The N. M. McLean yards continue to be busy. Keels have been laid for two new landing boats for the government marine department. One of the new boats measures 20 feet while the other is 18 feet in length. In addition the schooner Thelma II, is on the ways for hull repairs and the schooner White Lily is up for a general looking to.

Zorra in With Scow
The power boat Zorra, Capt. Roy Brown, arrived in port from Georgetown on Wednesday having in tow a new float which is to be used in connection with hand logging at Tucks Inlet. The new float has built upon it a fine roomy living shack and presents a very smart appearance having been newly painted in red with white facings.

The salmon boat First Place is on the Ward Ways for intensive overhaul.

Inez H. Out
After having had a new 40 horse power Standard Semi-Diesel engine installed in Vancouver, and having completed other necessary repair work in port, the Inez H., owned by the Ness Brothers, cleared port early in the week on her first halibut hunting trip of the season. With the increased power Inez will be in the forefront of the fleet in future.

The Canadian schooner N. & S., Capt. H. Lear, which arrived in port over last week end, after undergoing necessary minor fixings, cleared again on Monday to renew hostilities with the wily halibut.

Fish Business
During the week 179,100 lbs. of halibut has been marketed on the Fish Exchange. Canadians were high at 21c. and 10c. and low at 15.5c and 8c. Americans were high at 19.7 and 9c. and low at 17.5c and 8c. Towena Started Upon
The new \$7,000 logging boat Towena, which is under reconstruction for skipper John Field at the Bone Yard Creek ways, is rapidly taking shape. The hull is being re-ribbed and the interior is being re-modelled. Several new ideas in connection with the transportation game, are to be embodied in the new craft. When completed the boat will be so constructed that it can engage in almost any nautical business that offers. The Towena will be commissioned in the transportation business between Butedale and Kitimaat.

The scow, on which living quarters have been erected recently in Bone Yard Creek, and which is to be used in the Wark Canal district for logging purposes, has recently been fitted with a Deleo lighting system.
