MILLION DOLLAR TRAIN ROBBERY CHICAGO

T. D. PATTULLO HAS TO GO TO AID OF H. G. PERRY AT PRINCE GEORGE

Million Dollars Stolen from Train at Chicago

Robbers Boarded it at Crossing and Gun Fight Followed in which one said to be Killed.

CHICAGO, June 13. — Forty pouches of registered mail containing currency and bonds to the amount of over a million dollars were stolen by bandits who held up a train thirty miles north of Chicago last night.

The robbers boarded the train while it was slowing up at a crossing. The train crew offered resistance and in a gun fight one of the bandits was reported killed.

CITY RECEIVES HALF YEARLY LIQUOR CHECK

Share this Time is \$8,728 in Addition to Hospital Share

A check has been received by the city treasurer from the provincial government for \$8,728.47 representing the city's share of liquor profits for the six months ending March 31 this year. In addition to this the hospital board receives direct something in the neighborhood of \$3,740 with deductions. Of the \$8,728.47 received by the city thirty-five per cent is earmarked for schools. According to the system of distributing liquor profits in the province as a whole, one half goes to the credit of the provincial consolidated revenue fund. Of the remaining fifty per cent sixty-five per cent goes direct to the municipalities on a per capita basis while the remaining thirty-five per cent of the half is paid to hospitals and charities.

Computing on this basis of population, Prince Rupert's total liquor revenue would be \$21,938.40 of which the government keeps half, the other half comprising the \$8,728.47 for the city and the \$3,740.76 for the hospitals and charities.

D. C. McRae, president of the hospital board, stated this morning that the hospital had not yet received a check.

SEA LIONS ARE BEING KILLED

Givenchy Officers and Crew Shoot Number Near Rivers Inlet

VANCOUVER, June 13. — 2,500 sea lions have been destroyed by the Dominion government patrol boat Givenchy during the past two weeks north of Vancouver Island. The sea lions prey upon the salmon and other edible fish and annually destroy a large number.

Armed with a machine gun and rifles the crew worked along the productive salmon areas in the vicinity of Virgin Rocks near Rivers Inlet with great success.

Pat McCulloch and His Troupe Ordered off Gunhild on Instructions from Vancouver Owner

The Pat McCulloch vaudeville outfit, which staged a show in the Westholme Theatre last night followed by a dance in the Elks' Home, has been ordered off the steam yacht Gunhild on which it made the trip up the coast. A breach of contract not on the part of the troupe itself but by parties who recently made a deal to purchase the boat from its owner, Mr. Hastings of Vancouver, and who subsequently chartered it to the show people caused such action being taken. As a result, the future plans of Pat McCulloch and his party are upset, the disarrangement being further aggravated by the accident which befel Mr. McCulloch last week. The Gunhild is still at the dry dock where she was put up for cleaning and painting.

KILLED ABOARD A BATTLESHIP

Quantity of Powder Exploded on Mississippi and 36 Lives Lost

WERE TESTING GUN

SAN PEDRO, Cal., June 13. — Three officers and 33 enlisted men were killed aboard the United States battleship Mississippi when the turret exploded after dropping anchor in the harbor yesterday afternoon.

Four powder bags containing 40 pounds of explosive were inside the turret at the time of the explosion. A fourteen inch rifle that ignited the powder supply was practicing firing at an elevation, the idea being to take advantage of the battleship's roll or list to prove the maximum altitude and efficiency of the gun.

MONTREAL, June 13. — James Carruthers, grain exporter, says the proposal to establish a grain elevator at Prince Rupert is economically sound. It is far better to build this elevator, he says, and abandon the scheme to complete the Hudson Bay railway since Hudson Bay as a grain port will never be realized.

STRIKE IN LONDON SETTLED YESTERDAY

LONDON, June 13. — The strike in the London power stations, which has crippled the transportation lines ended last night.

IRISHMAN GOES TO WASHINGTON

Timothy A. Middy Appointed Minister to Washington by Irish Free State

DUBLIN, June 13. — Professor Timothy A. Middy of Cork has been appointed Minister Plenipotentiary of the Irish Free State at Washington, it was announced by Desmond Fitzgerald, minister for foreign affairs. His appointment has been expected for some time and action awaited only the approval of the British Government.

H. G. Perry Rushed to Hospital With Appendicitis After Tour of Triumph: Pattullo has to go

Hon. T. D. Pattullo last night received word that H. G. Perry, Liberal candidate for Prince George riding, is in the hospital at Edmonton undergoing an operation from appendicitis. With the news came a call to the minister for help in the emergency with the result that Mr. Pattullo, instead of returning here from Terrace on Saturday night, will go through to Prince George and return here on Wednesday.

Mr. Pattullo was loath to leave his own constituency just on the eve of the election, when his presence here might mean much, but he said he was sure the people of Prince Rupert would appreciate the situation and it would make no difference on election day. At any rate it was his duty to go and he is away. He left early this morning for Porcher Island and other nearby places. He will catch the train tomorrow at Haysport en route to Terrace.

Yesterday Mr. Pattullo visited Georgetown and Port Simpson and he feels assured that he will get strong support from all the small places, where his work is appreciated.

Only yesterday morning Mr. Pattullo received a telegram from Mr. Perry at Spirit River telling of the splendid reception he had had in the Peace River country, which would return him a good majority on the twentieth. He was much encouraged and felt sure of winning the seat. Then he was stricken with appendicitis and had to be rushed to the hospital.

EDMONTON, June 13. — H. G. Perry, M.L.A. of Fort George was stricken with appendicitis here yesterday and was operated upon immediately. He is reported in a satisfactory condition.

ASSIZES CLOSE AT NOON TODAY

Prince Rupert Logging Co. Get Judgment; Smithers Case Dismissed

The spring session of the Supreme Court Assizes here concluded at noon today. Yesterday and today was devoted to the hearing of civil cases.

In the action of Lindland vs. Gazanoff in which an accounting was asked with respect to a partnership, Mr. the Salt Lake. Actual construction Justice Gregory dismissed the claim of the plaintiff for a half and all should be finished by the interest. His Lordship found, middle of next week.

CLEVELAND, June 13. — Brigadier-General Charles G. Dawes of Illinois, the "Hell and Maria" general, was nominated by the Republican national convention last night after Frank G. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, had been nominated and refused to accept it.

MARIETTA, Ohio, June 13. — General Dawes was here attending a college function at his old home when he accepted the vice-presidential nomination.

Charles Gates Dawes was born at Marietta, Ohio, in 1865. He was the executive of the McKinley movement which led to the election of that president. He is a lawyer and financier of note as well as a politician. He took part in the great war and was decorated by the French and Belgians for gallantry in action and for distinguished services. He is an author of some note and is a Mason and an Elk.
