FINAL FIGURES ON FISH PACK

Total Much Greater Than Last Year For Canned Salmon

Final figures for the 1924 salmon pack obtained this morning show that a total of 1,140,497 cases of all varieties were put up in District No. 2 as compared with 875,803 cases in 1923. The large increase over last year was largely due to pinks and chums which totalled much in excess of 1923. Sockeyes showed a slight increase while springs and cohoes were down.

The decrease in cohoes was simply due to the fact that the fish were not obtainable.

A similar reason does not apply to the decrease in springs. The mild curing of this variety has proven more popular and a large quantity were thus put up. The figures will compare favorably with last year. The quantity of dry salted will be larger than last year.

The big increase in the pink pack was largely due to the fact that the north end of the Queen Charlotte Islands only packs alternate years and in 1924 the largest pack on record for the Massett area—over 110,000 cases—was put up whereas last year there was none.

The increase in chums was principally in the central division between Ogden Channel and Fitzhugh Sound.

All salmon fishing except trolling is now closed and there is very little trolling. The canneries are all closed now and such fish as is caught is sold over the local fresh fish exchange.

QUASHES ONE SENTENCE AND CONFIRMS ANOTHER

W. G. Cooper of Moricetown Gets Off but J. S. Kelly Must do Time

SMITHERS, Nov. 3.—A regular sitting of the County Court was held in the police station at Smithers on Thursday and Friday of last week with Judge Young of Prince Rupert presiding.

In addition to minor court work there were two appeals slated for a hearing. The first being that of Wm. G. Cooper of Moricetown against a sentence of six months given for an alleged infraction of the B.C. Liquor Act, the charge being that of selling

liquor to Indians. This appeal was allowed by the judge and the conviction quashed, on the ground that the charge should have been laid under the Dominion "Indian Act" which takes precedence over Provincial jurisdiction for an offense of this nature.

H. L. Robinson was counsel for the crown and L. S. McGill and M. Gonzales for the defendant.

The second appeal that of Jos Kelly of Smithers against a similar sentence handed to him by Magistrate Hoskins on the charge of having liquor for sale, was disallowed by Judge Young and the conviction confirmed.

H. L. Robinson also handled this case for the crown, while L. S. McGill acted for the defendant.
