Inter-sectional football will play a big part on the inter-collegiate gridiron in the United States this fall. Several important games between strong teams from different sections of the States are scheduled, these games being the only available basis of comparison between the grade of football as played in the East, in the west and south of the Mason-Dixon line. The Army leads the list with four inter-sectional contests on its schedule. Notre Dame meets three teams out of its territory, while Yale, Brown, Penn State and Boston College each play two inter-sectional games. Notre Dame's invasion of the east, where the Army and Princeton will be met on successive Saturdays, followed by a game at South Bend against Georgia Tech's Golden Tornado, looms as the most formidable of all inter-sectional assignments.

The easiest reason to give for the contraction of western professional hockey interests by the recent amalgamation of the Western and Pacific Hockey Leagues is the scarcity of first-class professional players says the Montreal Star. It was no small task building up the Pacific Coast League but it was successfully done though apparently one mistake was made at the start and that was to make the Vancouver Arena with its red wood seats too large.

However, things seem to have gradually become flat in Seattle and Portland, which seems

strange, as far as Portland goes, to those who remember the trip of the Portland Rosebuds, as they were called in some parts of the East, to Montreal in search of the Stanley Cup, when all Portland seemed to be hockey mad. There will be six teams this winter, consisting of Calgary, Regina, Saskatoon, Edmonton, Vancouver and Victoria. Each team is to play fourteen home games.

WASHINGTON IN WORLD SERIES

Wins Pennant by Beating Boston and Will Have to Play New York

BIG GAME SATURDAY

All Eyes Now on the Two Teams That Will Close the Baseball Season

BOSTON, Sept. 30. — Washington won its first American League pennant and the right to meet the New York Giants in the world series by defeating Boston yesterday.

The big games commence on Saturday next at Washington and the second game will be played in the same city. This will be followed by two games in New York and if more than four games are necessary the fifth also will be played in the same city and the sixth in Washington. The seventh, if there should be one will be decided later.

SIXTH AVENUE WEST OF FULTON STREET TO BE OPENED UP

The city council, on recommendation of the Board of Works decided last night to prepare a bylaw providing for the grading of an 18 foot roadway on Sixth Avenue between Fulton and Taylor Streets.

The immediate object in opening up this road, which has long been desired by residents in the neighborhood, is to give access to a rock quarry there. When the supply at the corner of second Avenue and Fifth Street has been exhausted, it is the intention to move the rock crushing equipment there. The new road will also give another means of access to the Exhibition Hall and the sports ground and it is the intention to have it ready by next year.
