Hospital Board Finds It Necessary to Face Expenditure of \$1,700 for New Part

Practically agreeing that the expenditure of something like \$1700 was necessary in order to provide a new transformer and electrical installation for the x-ray equipment at the General Hospital, the hospital board at a special meeting last night passed on to the executive committee auhority to take further action

on the matter. E. K. Knott, x-ray expert, and Ernest Love, superintendent of utilities, were in conference with the board. Mr. Knott, in a communication, stated that the motor had burned out owing to the transformer having broken down. The motor was obsolete anyway and, instead of renewing he recommended that a new! one be purchased.

There was a lengthy discussion resulting in the general agreement that it would be best to purchase the new machine. The difficulty, however, it was! pointed out, would arise in paying for the machine. S. K. Campbell, chairman of the finance committee, suggested that some special effort should be made to raise this money so as not to tax general hospital finances to the breaking point. It was suggested that the support of public bodies be sought in a special campaign .

Finally it was decided to refer the whole matter to the executive committee with power to act in devising ways and means.

Before the x-ray equipment is put in an entirely satisfactory condition and paid for, the expenditure will probably reach \$2,500, there being some balances still unpaid on former installation and repairs.


