Shanghai is Surrendered MR. Kiangu Armies Fighting Losses Reported

SHANGHAI, Sept. 20 .- The surrender of Shanghai to the Kiangu armies was admitted this morning at headquarters the defenders at Lungwha. It is asserted, however, that contrary to common reports, the defending Chekiang soldiers were not in retreat.

A Lungwha statement, which declared that the Chekiang fighters were inflicting heavy losses on their opponents and were capturing many prisoners belonging to the Honan and Anhwei regiments, was issued after renewed heavy artillery and machine gun fire had started,

Czar's Nephew Declares Himself Emperor of all Russia to Liberate It

LONDON, Sept. 20.—Grand Duke Cyril, cousin of the former Czar of Russia has signed a proclamation declaring himself Emperor of all the Russians, says a Berlin despatch.

The proclamation will be published on Sunday in the Russian newspapers issued at Belgrade. It will declare that the Grand Duke will devote himself to liberating Russia from the communists.


