OTTAWA, Nov. 17 .- The world] has an estimated bread and grain shortage of 574,000,000 bushels of wheat and 173,000,000 bushels. of rye.

JUNEAU, Nov. 17 .- Five Indians accused of having composed the band that trussed A. E. Cresa, postmaster and lone winter watchman at Hawk Inlet and looted the cannery commissary of guns, cartridges and money and food on November 5 are in custody here. They were surrendered by their fellow tribes-

The suspects were surrendered on Saturday night soon after they appeared in the native village at Juneau. Two of the reputed leaders of the band are recaptured prisoners, having broken jail here four days before the Hawk Inlet raid.
