## BOBBED SALARIES FOLLOW BOBBING OF HAIR OF TEACHERS

Pennsylvania City Takes Drastic Action to Stop Craze Which They Think Subversive of Propriety

NEWCASTLE, Pa., May 6. — (By Canadian Press) — Despite the nation wide agitation in favor of the abbreviation of woman's glory, the school board of Newcastle, pillars of things as they were, has registered strong disapproval of bobbed hair. Such is the feeling among the members of the Board, who consider the use of shears on back hair as subversive to propriety, that they have taken the extraordinary measure of bobbing the salaries of those female teachers who have had their hair cropped off short. The dictum has gone forth that only those teachers who still adhere to the psychic knot or pompadour or other means of carrying their hair with them, are to have their salaries increased by one hundred dollars this year. The Board has not yet decided as yet whether those with three feet of hair shall be given a bonus.

Simultaneously with this announcement of the Board comes the word from several Pennsylvania hospitals that nurses with bobbed hair are looked on with disfavor by patients. Patients are said to consider bobbed hair indicative of frivolity, joviality, good health and insouciance. The hospitals will not permit nurses in training to have their hair bobbed except in cases where said nurses are victims of typhoid or scarlet fever.

## EDMONTON MERCHANTS WANT TO KEEP OPEN

Object to Half Holiday During Summer Months but Would Give Clerks Time Off

A request from retail merchants of the city that stores be allowed to remain open until 6.00 p.m. for six days of the week throughout the summer was made to Mayor Blatchford by a delegation representing the merchants. Instead of the half day closing for four of the summer months the merchants offer to arrange to let members of their staffs have the half holiday but so distributed throughout the week as to permit the stores to be kept open.

The business men contend that trade conditions generally have not revived sufficiently to warrant closing stores for half a day during the week, yet although they were opposed to closing they did not object to the clerks having a free half day by so arranging shifts in order to keep the

## NEW WHEAT ALREADY ABOVE GROUND ALBERTA

Increased Acreage This Year and Moisture Generally Sufficient

EDMONTON, May 6.—Advent of warm spring weather has hastened activity upon the land in Alberta, and operations are general. Seeding of wheat in the southern districts of the province is about 50 per cent completed, with 60 and 70 per cent done in some localities, while in the central and northern districts seeding is well under way. In a few places in southern Alberta the new wheat is reported already above the ground. Some seeding of oats has also been done in the south, says the second fortnight report issued by the provincial department of agriculture.

Moisture conditions for the most part are favorable, but in southeastern localities the soil is very dry and more moisture is needed for satisfactory germination. This condition does not exist, however, over a very widespread area. Slight rains have fallen during the past week in the Medicine Hat area, and heavier rains towards Lethbridge and along the foothill areas. No fresh precipitation in the central and northern areas has been recorded since last report.

Indications are that there will be a slightly increased acreage in wheat this season, most districts reporting to this effect, while one of two districts in the north report reduced areas. The fact that very little fall ploughing was done last fall makes any large increase in wheat acreage impossible.

Reports from southern districts indicate that there will be a large increase in acreage in fodder crops, particularly corn and sweet clover. Lethbridge district reporting a probable 100 per cent increase in these crops this season.

## NO RIGHT TO OFFER RIDE TO STRANGERS

EDMONTON, May 5. — Two young men of the city have found out that it is not advisable to ask young ladies with whom they are not acquainted to go for an auto ride when they see them on the street. A few evenings ago Walter Allen and Arthur Martin were driving along the street in a motor car when they saw two young ladies on the sidewalk nearby. They pulled the car to the curb and offered a lift but the young ladies resented the invitation. Just about the same time Sgt. Watson of the city police was coming along, and noticing the incident made some inquiries. The girls said that they did not know the boys and apparently resented their action.

The police officer continued his inquiries and the result was that Allen and Martin were summoned to police court on a charge of "obstructing pedestrians." In court Allen admitted his guilt and Martin's case was set down for a later date as he was prevented
