## HON. T. D. PATTULLO UPHOLDS POSITION IN LETTER TO PRESS

Urges Against Misinformation, and Misrepresentation in Connection With Capilano Lands

The following letter was published in the Vancouver press from Prince Rupert's member:

Reports in the press indicate that the mayor of Vancouver proposes to ask me for an explanation of the sale of six limits in the Capilano watershed to private interests since the reserve of 1905.

The items have appeared in the press in this connection are based upon a communication, according to the press reports, sent to the Property Owners' Association, Vancouver. The information sent to the Property Owners' Association, Vancouver, indicated very clearly just how and when the timber limits referred to were alienated, and the information was available before the publication of these reports.

I cannot come to any other conclusion than that these reports are deliberately published for the purpose of creating an impression in the public mind that this department, during the regime of the present administration, has disposed of timber limits within the Capilano watershed since the placing of the reserve of 1905.

Let me say that the limits referred to as having been alienated since the reserve of 1905, with one exception, were staked during the time that timber was open for staking in this province during the McBride-Bowser administration. The only timber that has been disposed of since the present administration took office are two small fractions of isolated timber adjacent to the operations of the Capilano Logging Company, which it was desirable should be logged in view of the operations now going on in the watershed. One of these strips contained some four and three-quarter million feet and the other some two hundred and seventy thousand. In both of these instances it would have been simply foolish to leave these isolated stands situate as they were.

### Has the Authority

In view of the fact, however, that the right to dispose of any timber within the Capilano reserve has been called in question, it may just as well be clearly understood that there is not the slightest question of the authority to dispose of the timber in the watershed if it should be so determined.

It is about time that the good sense of those in authority in Vancouver should prevail, rather than misinformation and misrepresentation should continue to be circulated. The protection of the Capilano watershed is of first importance and the only way that it can be protected is through the collaboration and co-operation of the provincial government, the city of Vancouver and the logging company now operating there.

I earnestly hope that the mayor of Vancouver will accept my suggestion and appoint three experts who, with three experts appointed by this department, can thoroughly review the whole situation in order that the most expert opinion may be available for final determination of policy.

There is no doubt that a larger measure of control must be exercised over the operations of the logging company if the watershed is to be protected to its highest purposes and there is equally no doubt that this object can only be attained through mutual understanding and co-operation. The people of Vancouver would do well to take the good intentions of the government and this department of government at their face value. The government is just as anxious to protect the interests of Vancouver in the Capilano watershed as is Vancouver city itself, and it has, at the same time, the duty of protecting the interests of all the other municipalities adjacent, as well as the interest of the province at large.

### Will Not be Bluffed

It may just as well be understood clearly and definitely now that I, personally, have no intention of being bluffed, browbeaten, bulldozed nor calumniated into submission to the dictation of a few interested persons who know little of the real situation but who, for purposes of their own,

appeal to the natural self-interest of the people of Vancouver who, in general, know nothing of the situation but who very naturally are fearful and nervous in a matter so important as their water supply.

It is about time that those in authority in Vancouver got down to common sense business to collaborate and co-operate with the government, rather than indulging in long-distance sniping which accomplishes nothing and frightens nobody.
