**DANCER OF SHOW TROUP INJURED**

Paddy McCulloch Fell Through Window of Royal Hotel While Putting up Sign This Morning

While putting up a poster in the Royal Hotel this morning, Paddy McCulloch, dancing member of a travelling show troupe which is in the city, slipped from a chair on which he was standing and, putting his left foot through a door window, an artery of his leg was pierced. The injured man bled profusely and City Police Sergeant A. H. Bailey and Dr. J. A. West were called to the scene. The latter gave first aid before McCulloch was removed to the hospital where the shattered glass was removed from the flesh.
