FAILURE OF OLD METHODS

Retiring Moderator of Presbyterian Assembly Says Former Institutions no Longer Avail

OWEN SOUND, June 6.—"Once again after well nigh 2,000 years there is a feeling that the existing order waxeth old and is ready to perish and that old institutions no longer avail and that without some spiritual rebirth human history must end in confusion," declared Right Rev. Alfred Gandier, D.D., retiring moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly in his valedictory address yesterday. Continuing, he said:

"The things in which men most trusted have failed and failed on a world scale. Scientific research, which had seemed to guarantee to the race a progress unbroken and unlimited, as a matter of fact put the power of gods into the hands of demons and, having whittled the sword for slaughter, now threatens the race with extermination."

"Great things had been hoped from education, from international law and the growth of world commerce. But when the crisis came these restraining influences were swept away like cobwebs before the elemental passions of selfish greed, envy, jealousy and hatred."

The speaker declared that all were in agreement that to remedy this condition the springs of action must be touched and the moral and religious life of men must be renewed at its sources and some new passion of love be rekindled.



PREFER SUICIDE TO ENFORCED MARRIAGE

Two Young Girls Hang Selves But Trees Broke in Other Cases and Ladies Alive

TAIHOKE, Formosa, June 6.—A suicide pact among four young girls of one of the aboriginal Formosan tribes in the interior of this island, resulting in the death of two of the covenantees, has brought to light an invasion of modern ideas even into that fastness of savage life.

The four girls, between 15 and 18 years old, all had had modern education in schools established by the Japanese. They had heard something about the right of women to decide for themselves in regard to marriage, an entirely new idea in the community in which they were reared. When the parents of one tried to force her into an unwelcome marriage, the four agreed to die together. They tried hanging. Two succeeded, but the trees selected by the others broke under their weight and they lived.
