SEATTLE, Nov. 27 .- Four men are held in jail here and one is in custody at Victoria, B.C., while two men are wanted by the Canadian authorities in connection with an internationa double murder case in which W. G. Gillis and his son William of Vancouver were killed, when the rum boat Beryl G. hijacked the liquor cargo on September 18 in the Gulf of Georgia.


