## ANYOX ELKS FINE CONCERT

Ed. Cragg Makes Hit at Smelter Town in Comedy Role

ANYOX, April 2.—When the "Brother Bills" of Anyox, set out to put on an entertainment that will stand out as something different from the average run of amateur evenings, no effort is spared to make it so. The show staged on Friday night last by the Elk's Vaudeville and Minstrel Troupe was no exception to this rule, and a packed house testified its approval of the splendid efforts of the entertainers. Comedy of no mean order was the order of the next number "Mr. Gallagher and Mr. Shean," and done to turn by Bob Watson and Bud Sheen. The next number was a "Chinese Dance" by Kathleen Bruggy. This young lady gave a very graceful exposition of an Oriental dancer. Mart and Pep next brought down the house, the funninesses of Pep, (V. Cruickshank) keeping the audience in roars of laughter.

The concluding feature of the night was a real old time minstrel act directed by Ed. Cragg. The interlocutor was B. Buck, and he kept the end men and singers on the job, and no slow stuff was permitted. The circle consisted of H. B. Chapman, F. Hegerty, J. Creechen, H. A. Berry, E. Cragg, A. S. Nickerson, A. P. Williams and P. Wishart, the end men being G. A. Gray, B. Sheen, R. Watson and E. J. Waterman. Old standbys of minstrelsy were put over and went just as well as in the days of long ago, and died as laugh-getters with the latest gags framed for the occasion by the wits of the lodge. The singing in this part was very good, the chorus being especially strong, harmonized well and was in keeping with the general excellence of the show. The songs were "I Love Me," Ed. 
## GEORGE McNICHOLL CELEBRATES APRIL 1
