BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Careless Handling of Opening Bid Cited

One of the principal marks of an "old-fashioned" bidder is his careless handling of the opening bid of one no trump. His requirements for such an opening are a balanced hand and "something" in every suit.

When you realize that "something" could be anything from an ace down to almost anything, it is clear that there could be a wide range of strength between a minimum and maximum holding.

Today the high card strength for an opening one no trump is held between narrow limits—three and one-half to four honor tricks or 16 to 18 points in the Work count or about 11 to 12 count, Four Aces.

In the hand just before this one, Mr. Fusty, whose bidding methods go back to auction days, opened one no trump with a jack above an average hand. In this deal, as you see, he made the same opening with three aces, a king, three queens and two jacks. It's pretty hard to know when to raise him and when to pass.

Mr. Dale, with hopeless looking suits of his own, decided to try and hit something in his partner's hand, and opened the seven of spades. The four was played from dummy and, after some thought, Mrs. Keen won with the ace. Mr. Fusty dropping the jack. A spade was returned and dummy's 10 won.

A successful heart finesse was taken and Mr. Fusty then led a small diamond and put up dummy's queen. Mrs. Keen won with the king and led a third spade, taken by dummy's king.

Thus, Mr. Fusty was enabled to take another heart finesse and rack up nine tricks—two spades, three hearts, three clubs and a diamond. Mrs. Keen could have held him a trick by ducking the first spade lead, thereby killing one of the entries to the board.

"Maybe you'd better tell me more about your opening no trump bids," said Mr. Champion testily.

"I just told you on the last hand," replied Mr. Fusty, "they mean I have better than an average hand and no biddable suit."

"In my league," went on Mr. Champion, "an opening no trump shows from 40 per cent to a little less than 50 per cent of the high cards. Your hand was too strong for that bid."

"In my league," said Mr. Fusty, "they mean just what I told you twice."

Mr. Champion correctly figured there was no point in discussing the matter further.

Hill-side Shrines Difficult Job For Construction

MONTREAL (CP)—North America's most modern "Way of the Cross" is taking shape here against great construction difficulties.

Fourteen stations, or shrines, are being carved out of the rocky mountainside above St. Joseph's Oratory, one of the continent's most famous Roman Catholic shrines. One of the stations has been completed, but the whole work will not be finished until about 1960.

The traditional "Way of the Cross" depicts various episodes in the Passion of Christ, and the St. Joseph's project ends at the spot where there will be a marble tomb with a figure of Christ emerging, symbolizing the resurrection.

Chief difficulty has been the placing and carving of the 46 modernistic statues resigned by the French-speaking sculptor, Louis Parent of Montreal.

The original plan to fashion them in a studio was abandoned because of the danger involved in hoisting them over difficult terrain. The next idea was to carve them on the spot by using pulverized rock blown back under pressure into solid form. But the method is being dropped because the first two statues done that way showed the artificial stone was too hard to cut.

Final solution was to carve the statues in sections below, and assemble them at the site. Sculptor Parent says: "No one will notice the difference when the pieces are carefully fitted together."

men with long beards sailed up the Oxtall. The first night the party made camp under the lee of a very high cliff. Night came and a great fire was built. By morning the fire had burnt a large patch of moss. A maid, standing by the fire, saw the strange carvings on the cliff.

The carvings were the same as those on the cliffs in Metlakatla Passage. The chief called out to the rest of the party and said the carvings solved the mysterious Hieroglyphs in Metlakatla Passage. They had not been carved by the mermaid of Chatham Sound, but must have been carved by the sailors with long beards and white skin.

The legend concludes that the "white sailors" once belonged to the fleet of Alexander the Great, one of the greatest fleets that had ever sailed the waters of the Persian Gulf, disappeared after Alexander died, and was not seen afterwards.
