## EASTER MUSIC IN CHURCHES

Attendance at Services was Large Yesterday and Appropriate Sermons Preached.

**Presbyterian Church**  
A children's service was held at the Presbyterian Church in the morning, the junior choir, under the direction of Mrs. H. R. Grant, providing the musical program which consisted of several choruses. The children also recited Bible selections preceding and in the course of Dr. Grant's address.

In the evening, the attendance was so large that people were turned away from the doors. The choir rendered two anthems—"Christ, Our Passover" and "Seek Ye the Lord." S. K. **HEALING IS BY NATURAL LAWS**  
So Says Dr. Clem Davies in Discussing What is Known as Divine Healing

VICTORIA, April 21.—Dr. Clem Davies of Centennial Methodist Church declares that all healing is alike, according to divine law. He thinks too much dependence is placed on professional and evangelistic healers.

"The successful healer has a psychology of his own which he imparts to his patient and through which his patient secures freedom from all dependence on the healer, teacher and doctor. What every person needs is a wholesome philosophy of healing and life. This is better than a temporary cure which wears off after the personal magnetism of the healer is no longer present," states Dr. Davies.

"The whole trouble with the Price campaign was that thousands of people were all at sea about the whole business after Dr. Price left, and the ministers themselves were unable to carry on the work because it was tied up to Dr. Price's personality too strongly," says Dr. Davies.

**Strip from Badges**  
"We have got to strip the philosophy of divine healing from all its badges, and sectarian and theological limitations. There are the 'mind cure,' the 'faith cure,' the 'prayer cure,' the 'mental science cure,' and the other 'science cures,' and apparently they do all their miracles with the same old powerful instrument: the patient's imagination, or as Coue calls, the subconscious mind."

"These are all different names, but I contend that there is no difference in the process. But they do not give the subconscious mind, namely, the person himself cured, the credit; each sect claims that its way differs from the ways of the others; as for example, Dr. Price's refusal to annoint a Christian Scientist or Spiritualist."

"There is one Divine law of bodily healing, and only one. It is scientific and operates through religion and even apart from it, the same as the sun's power operates impartially on the evil and the good," concludes the Centennial pastor.
