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RACE AROUND WORLD PROCEEDS MERRILY

EXPECTED THAT CONTRACT FOR BUILDING OF SHIP WILL BE LET TODAY

Big International Air Race is Proceeding and Being Eagerly Watched

Britisher Reached Baghdad Yesterday and Major Martin Ready to Hop for Dutch Harbor Today.

LONDON, April 21.—The race to be first in the round the world flights now being conducted by British and American aviators is attracting much attention here and people eagerly await the news of the progress of the airmen. Opinion is pretty well divided as to which country is likely to win out and there is some betting on the results.

ZEEZA, Palestine, April 20.—Stuart MacLaren, British round the world flyer, resumed his flight toward Baghdad at 9:20 this morning.

BAGHDAD, April 21.—Stuart MacLaren arrived here at 5:30 Sunday night, completing a non-stop flight from Zeeza of some 600 miles in eight hours and made a perfect landing. This morning MacLaren starts for Bushire, 500 miles from Baghdad.

American Flyers

CORDOVA, April 21.—Major Martin, commander of the U.S. round the world flyers, is expected to hop off from Kanakut for Dutch Harbor this morning to rejoin the three other planes awaiting him there. A new engine has been installed in his plane "The Seattle."

Awaiting Airmen

KASHIWARA BAY, Keurile Islands, April 21.—The United States destroyer Ford carrying supplies for the United States globe aviators are anchored here to await the flyers.

The Canadian trawler Thierville is here laying in stores for Stuart MacLaren, the Britisher, who is attempting to encircle the earth.

Efforts to establish wireless communication with Alaska has thus far proved unsuccessful.

VICTORIA, April 21.—It is expected that H.M.G.S. Thierville will arrive at Yokohama on May 1, after having left supplies for the British aviators at suitable points along the route. Last week the vessel was at Kiska which she reached from Atka Island. She has several other stations to establish for Stuart MacLaren's use on his round the world flight.

BOSTON, April 21.—Because of a mutiny aboard the British steamer Newtonbay loaded with alcohol, the vessel sent a wireless message asking for aid for the steamer in a gale 65 miles off the coast. The crew were in irons below deck, having mutinied when their demands for increase of pay was refused.

FISHERIES CRUISER IS LAUNCHED TODAY

First of Boats Built Locally Took Water at Drydock This Morning Without Hitch

The first of the Department of Marine and Fisheries patrol cruisers was launched without hitch from the ship shed at the Canadian National drydock and shipyard this morning at 2:20 o'clock. It is now tied up at the pier. The vessel is practically completed, nothing but interior work now remaining to be done. It should be ready for service by the end of the month.

Work on the second boat is not so far advanced but it will be concentrated upon from this on as instructions have been received to rush the job.

The boat launched today is named the Vanidis. It will be used in the south. The second boat, the Rividis, will be used in the Rivers Inlet district by Overseer D. S. Cameron.

JAPAN MAKES BIG PROTEST

Four Public Meetings Held Yesterday in Tokio and Resolutions Passed

TOKIO, April 21.—The four major political parties of Japan each held meetings yesterday and adopted resolutions of protest against the United States Japanese exclusion legislation.

Representatives of fifteen Tokio newspapers met and agreed that restrained attitude was the wisest.

The Japan printing association at the general meeting voted to boycott all goods from the state of California.

Dr. Williams of University of B.C. to Lecture on Birds Before Going South

Dr. M. Y. Williams of the department of geology of the University of British Columbia, who has been lecturing at Anyox and who is going south tomorrow to lecture at Ocean Falls, has been spending a couple of days in the city and was particularly interested in finding a halibut at the Cold Storage plant which was dark on both sides, a most unusual thing in halibut.

Preparations Going Forward for Building Laminated Wood Factory Near Salvus: Piles are all Ready

Piling has been cut at Terrace for the foundation of the Skeena Laminated Wood Co. Ltd.'s veneer mill at Devil's Island near Salvus and actual construction of the plant will start just as soon as weather conditions permit. Frank F. Burdett, managing director of the company, stated on his return Saturday night from a trip to Terrace and the mill site. There is still a foot of soft snow at Salvus but this should soon disappear.

Mr. Burdett returns to Vancouver on the Princess Mary tomorrow and expects to be back in about three weeks bringing with him some men to supervise the putting in of a small mill to cut lumber for the mill buildings and also preliminary construction work.

Fred Nash is continuing survey work at the mill site.

WOMAN CANDIDATE IN SIMILKAMEEN

Hon. Dr. Sutherland Confident of Capturing Seats for Government in Southern Interior of Province

VICTORIA, April 21.—The Liberal party is running a woman candidate, Mrs. H. McGregor, for Similkameen and Hon. W. H. Sutherland, who has just returned from a tour of the interior, says that she will be elected at the forthcoming provincial contest.

Dr. Sutherland is particularly pleased with the result of his tour through the interior. He says he is confident that the government will increase the number of its supporters in that part of the province.

"The government certainly will hold its present strength in the central interior and undoubtedly will carry the new riding of Salmon Arm," Dr. Sutherland asserted. "The Liberals are also confident of capturing South Okanagan."

Dr. Sutherland conferred in Revelstoke, his own constituency, with his supporters, and left confident that he would be re-elected.

Increase Majority

"On the whole, so far as I could find, the government is absolutely safe in the central interior and should increase its present majority there," the minister declared emphatically.

He added that no date for an election had been fixed yet.

"When an election does take place, though, we have no doubt of what the result will be," he said.

"Before the end of this week the Liberals will have nominated candidates in South Okanagan, North Okanagan, Salmon Arm, Yale and Revelstoke. Nominations in the Kootenay country will take place on the week following. Arrangements for the Kootenay conventions are under way now."

MacLean's Seat Lost

Hon. J. D. MacLean, provincial secretary, will be offered the Liberal nomination in Yale, it is understood now. Yale Liberals are keen to have Dr. MacLean run in their riding and predict a sweeping majority for him if he will agree to represent the constituency. Dr. MacLean's present riding of Greenwood has been consolidated with Grand Forks. If Dr. MacLean carries Yale he will take one seat away from the opposition, which controls the riding now through the sitting member, John Melae.

NO ELECTION BRITAIN SOON

Premier Ramsay Macdonald Says it is His Duty to Carry on

LONDON, April 21.—Premier Ramsay Macdonald in an address here said it was his duty to carry on the Government and keep off a general election which nobody wanted. He saw no reason why there should be an election for two or three years.

The premier recommended that the reparations experts report be taken as a whole at once with everybody back of it. He urged unity among the allies who should accept Germany's word and admit her to the League of Nations.

PADRE ANDREWS DIED SATURDAY

Was Popular Rector of St. Mary's Oak Bay and Went Overseas

VICTORIA, April 21.—Colonel and Rev. G. H. Andrews, rector of St. Mary's Anglican Church, Oak Bay, died Saturday, following an operation for cancer at the Jubilee Hospital.

"Padre" Andrews, as he is familiarly called by his congregation and by most of the people of Oak Bay and Victoria, has been rector of St. Andrew's for a number of years and has always been a popular preacher, people coming from all over Victoria to attend his suburban church. He went overseas during the war and was much loved by both officers and men of his battalion. He was not married.
