Local Conservatives say they think they have a good chance of winning the seat, especially since the third party made such failure of its P.E.C. charges against Mr. Bowser.

## COAST STEAMER

Canadian Railway and Marine World had Stories About Her Early in Year

According to an Eastern authority the Prince Arthur, which lies across the Bay of Fundy, had been purchased by the Canadian National Railway and will be operated on this coast. An engineer in this city, who has worked on her says she is larger than the Prince Rupert or Prince George and a splendid sea boat and would be well fitted for the Alaska business. The following clipping from the Yarmouth Telegram published early in the year conveyed the news which is not credited as correct here but which will be read with some interest by local people:

"The British Columbia and Pacific Coast notes in the Canadian Railway and Marine World in its issue for January, says: 'The Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company will, it is reported, have to have more steamships in the coast service during the year. The recently acquired Prince Arthur is expected to be delivered from the Atlantic seaboard early in the spring, and the new steamship Prince Henry, being built by Swan & Hunter & Wigham Richardson, on the Tyne, is expected to be ready to put on her route in June.'

"It is rumored that the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Co. had its choice of selecting either the Prince Arthur or its sister ship, but following inspection, etc., they decided on the former as being the most suitable ship and most consistent to combat with their somewhat strenuous Pacific coast services. ## THE SILENT COMMAND PROMISES NEW THRILLS

Hero is Beset by Traps and Snares and There is a Love Theme Throughout

This screen drama, "The Silent Command," promises something new in the way of thrills. It was adapted from a story by Rufus King. J. Gordon Edwards was the director. The combined skill of these two motion picture experts has been centred on telling a vital and unusual story with a vigor and novelty of treatment that would insure its flattering reception by the mass of picture goers.

The principal note struck by the author is loyalty. It shows Captain Richard Decatur, a hero of the drama, beset on every side by the traps and snares of a relentless foe bent on removing the young naval officer from his path. Every manner of temptation is set before him. His life is endangered; the very sanctity of his home is invaded. While these plots and counter plots are being waged against him, he is forced into a series of adventures that would furnish plots for a dozen ordinary motion pictures.

The locale of the story shifts from New York and Washington to the Panama Canal, with scenes aboard U.S. warships and skulking craft controlled by the enemies of the captain. Glimpses of Annapolis on Commencement Day are shown. There are remarkable examples of the working of the wireless at sea. A terrific fight during a storm between Decatur and the chief of the plotters is followed by a shipwreck that is the acme of thrilling realism. Through the entire plot runs a beautiful thread of love and affection.
