## Democracy Not Always a Complete Success in Opinion Mr. Manson Council of Board of Trade and

"If ever there was a contentious and difficult law to administer it is the Liquor Act," declared Hon. A. M. Manson, Attorney General, in addressing the Rotary Club yesterday on some of the difficulties with which a minister has to contend and in urging his hearers to devote themselves to public service.

"With the unreasonable opinions of the prohibitionists on one side and that of the liquor men on the other, the liquor law is not one that any government would wish to have to administer. At first it took more than a third of my time but latterly things have been going better and it does not take anything like as much as that but yet it is responsible for more grey hairs than any other work I have to do."

### BUS STRIKE IN LONDON

Forty Thousand Men Are Out and London is Walking Today

LONDON, March 22 - The tramway and omnibus drivers and conductors are on strike and London people are forced to walk today. The strike is the result of a demand on the part of the tramway employees for higher wages and a sympathetic walkout by the omnibus men.

About 34,500 omnibuses are tied up and 40,000 employees are involved.

It is estimated that seven million people are carried on the trams and buses altogether daily, many of whom must otherwise walk.

There is a possibility that subway employees will join the strikers but at present will continue work.
