NATIONALIST SOUTH AFRICA

General Hertzog in Power Will Not be the Same Hertzog in Opposition

There will be a general feeling of regret throughout the Empire that an outstanding figure like General Smuts will now be compelled to relinquish the direction of public affairs in South Africa says the Victoria Times. On the other hand of course, the result of the elections is not in the remotest way associated with Smuts the international statesman; his defeat at the polls was brought about by his Government's policy in respect of important local affairs about the disposition of which the Premier's actions from time to time have been viewed with growing hostility among elements of the population who would wholeheartedly support him in questions of Empire or international significance.

As matters have developed the course which General Hertzog will take looms up interestingly in the speculative field. Office now awaits him; but such power as he may desire to wield in the House of Assembly depends upon the manner in which nearly a score of Laborites use their votes. His position will approximate that of Premier Macdonald in the British House.

The Nationalist-Labor pact, which has given Hertzog his following in sufficient volume to defeat General Smuts, will hold only as long as republicanism or other radical planks in the Nationalist platform shall be omitted from the legislative fare that may follow the assumption of office by the new Government. Colonel Creswell, the leader of the Labor party, put through his deal with Hertzog for the sole reason of overthrowing the Government; his most important condition was that the Nationalists should drop its secessionist movement. Hertzog saw the point and the chance which it gave him; he took it and won. Labor will hold him to his bargain—and probably want a seat or two in the Cabinet to clinch it.

Meanwhile, Nationalists in office, not forgetting Labor in Britain, will be quite different from Nationalists after the political scalp of General Smuts.

Alaska, announced that arrangements have been made between the American chairman and Yukon Commissioner G. P. McKenzie for the transportation of liquors from Prince Rupert to Telegraph Creek, B.C., via the Stikine river.

The official announcement said the negotiations had been approved by the treasury department at Washington and were made possible by the provisions of Article III. of the rum running treaty between Great Britain and the United States, proclaimed and made effective by President Coolidge on May 2 last.

The arrangements specify that the Yukon government shipments to be made from Prince Rupert in British bottoms the entire distance to Telegraph Creek, vessels entering at Ketchikan and proceeding under convoy through American territorial waters, the liquor cargoes to remain sealed while in American waters.

It is understood here that the liquor will be transported from Telegraph Creek to Atlin via the Canadian government trail and distributed from Dawson and Whitehorse. It is said the supplies of the big government stores there have been running low, forecasting a shortage which the new arrangement prevents.
