JASPER PARK AT WEMBLEY

Million Attend up to June 7; Pictures of Dominion Attract Many

MONTREAL, June 26.—Indications are not lacking that the British Empire Exhibition is fulfilling its mission in placing before the citizens of the British Isles the opportunities and developments of the Dominions overseas. In a letter received today at headquarters of the Canadian National Railways in Montreal William Phillips, European manager of the system, stated that up until June 7 the million mark in attendance had been passed at the Canadian National Railways pavilion at Wembley, the total number of visitors up to that being 1,012,000.

Distinguished Visitors

In addition to private individuals who have visited the Canadian National Railways exhibition, there have been a large number of distinguished persons. This list is naturally headed by their Majesties the King and Queen of Italy. Two former governors general, the Duke of Connaught and the Duke of Devonshire were also visitors. As was recorded some time ago, the brother of the King of Siam was one of those who was particularly interested in the transportation equipment exhibit of the Canadian National Railways, and Mr. Phillips reports that another member of royalty who evinced considerable interest in the particular exhibit was Count Asa, brother of the Mikado of Japan who with Countess Asa was a recent visitor to the building. The Countess expressed herself as being charmed with the revolving scenic model of Jasper National Park, Mount Robson and the triangle tour. Count Asa gave the equipment exhibit a most minute inspection.

He stated that owing to the fact that much rehabilitation of railways is to be done in his country because of the havoc wrought by the earthquake, he was casting about for ideas in transportation equipment and he expressed himself as being particularly interested in the tourist and colonist cars of Canadian National Railways.

Pictures of Canada

A portion of the Canadian National Railways building is devoted to the projection of motion pictures of Canada. Some of these pictures show many of the most beautiful scenic features of the Dominion and others dealt with the natural resources and industrial developments of the country. That their influence must necessarily be of a far reaching nature

ROAD HOUSES IN THE SKY

That is the Prediction of Lord Thomson, Air Minister, Given in Speech

LONDON, June 26.—After having taken a peep into the future, Air Minister Lord Thomson came down to the House of Lords recently and assumed the role of prophet. He said in three year's time he hoped to have in the air two kinds of airships suitable respectively to commercial and naval purposes. In ten years he hoped to see at least six airship constructors competing for orders in this country and building up a great and growing industry, serving the purposes of imperial communication, bringing people of the empire and the world closer together, and carrying freight as well as mails.

Sometimes in the future, the minister said, he foresaw the day when noble lords would leave Parliament House on gliders with light engines, and wing their way westward along the Thames valley or northwards to Scotland. On their way they will need a rest and perhaps they may call in at some great caravan-sarai floating serene, safe, high up, far removed from terrestrial fuss and noise.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1 Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 3,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Registration Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be issued.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumps.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the ranges are covered under a Grazing Commission. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
